BOARD OF TRADE MOURNS NO CONSTIPATION NO RILES.

THE PASSING OF SENATOR HENRY W. RICHARDSON.

Passes a Resolution of Appreciation of the Great Services He Rendered to the City and the Country.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade on Wednesday evening, J. G. Elliott moved a resolution expressing regret at the loss sustained by the Board in the death of Senator H. W. Richardson and requesting that a letter of condolence be sent to his family. Mr. Elliott and Mr. King paid eloquent and touching tributes to the great worth of the deceased as a business man and a citizen. The resolution is as follows:

"Moved by J. G. Elliott, seconded by Francis King: That the members of the Board of Trade sincerely deplore the loss that has come to it and the city at large through the sudden death of Hon. H. W. Richardson. Our deceased associate was a man of splendid business sagacity, accurate judgment, and high probity. He was alert, active and reliable in his dealings with his fellows. He risked, but not without forethought and close reasoning, and if he failed he accepted his losses with a cheerfulness and generous spirit that showed that he was not averse to meeting conclusions with hope and candor.

"It is recalled with pride that the deceased senator loved Kingston, had an abiding faith in its future, though with a nature such as he possessed he chafed at its slowness in emerging into a place of business such as its position demanded. He rejoiced much over its high standing for culture, education and science. As a commercial point he sought for its upbuilding and advancement. He invested money to that end. He leaves an honorable record for regard for his native place that is worthy of emulation.

"Our deceased member was energetic in all public activities. In financial circles, in church endeavors, in social movements he had a place and gave time and talents to the accomplishment of those things tending to the advancement and uplifting of society. He so ably performed the tasks of daily life, so freely gave of himself to public good that the community accepted with a glad call of the Government to him to accept a place in the Senate, an honor the city shared as her own. He rendered acceptable service during the brief period he filled an honorable place in the Senate.

"In his home he was happy and contented; it was his work and pleasure and delight, and amid his family he enjoyed the fullest amount of felicity.

"As a man of high citizenship, of true ideals, of business capacity, of noble ambitions and of earnest Christian devotion, this Board expresses its admiration of all his works and regrets that he is no longer with us. He is sorely missed and his death is regretfully deplored his death and offers to those bereaved sincere and earnest sympathy."

SERIOUS MILK SHORTAGE

EXTRA DEMAND DURING EPIDEMIC GIVEN AS CAUSE.

Owing to Scarcity of Help Many Farmers Have Allowed Their Cows to Go Dry—Milk Vendors Besieged With Orders.

There is a serious shortage of milk in the city and vendors are finding it impossible to meet the demand.

The reason given for the shortage is the extra demand made for milk since the outbreak of the "flu" and the fact that owing to a shortage of help many of the farmers have allowed their cows to go dry. However, now that the epidemic is practically over, it is believed that the situation will be greatly relieved.

Every month there is a great demand for milk, and storekeepers informed the Whig that it was impossible for him to get all the milk he needed to supply his customers. On Wednesday morning a number of marine men spent an hour or so looking for milk and then had to give up the task. They encountered several milk vendors, but they were unable to sell any, as all they had was barely enough to supply their customers.

It is stated that the high cost of food is another reason for the scarcity of milk.

A citizen stated that he tried to get a couple of quarts from his milkman on Wednesday but he had to be satisfied with one quart. Several people had similar stories to tell. In Ottawa and other places, a serious shortage of milk is also reported.

IRA A. KIP WEDS.

Divorced Last May, He Marries a Merry Widow.

Mrs. Josephine Taylor Farington, daughter of F. Taylor, was married at noon Monday to Mr. A. Kip, Jr. The wedding took place at Darlen, Conn. The Rev. E. A. Carter officiated. Mr. and Mrs. Kip went to Hot Springs, Va., for their honeymoon and will live at 25 West Fifty-sixth street, New York.

Mr. Kip was married twenty-five years ago to Miss Katharine Flower, niece of the late Roswell P. Flower. They had four children. The first Mrs. Kip brought suit for divorce at Poughkeepsie, May 10th, 1918, alleging that Mr. Kip had deserted at the Hotel Vanderbilt March 27th with a woman unknown to the complainant as "Mr. and Mrs. Ira A. Kip, New York." The action was not defended, and Mrs. Kip married again in September.

Mr. Kip is president of the Duracore Company, textile manufacturers. He began his business career with H. H. Crocker & Co., East Indian importers and brokers. He was a member of the New York Stock Exchange from 1901 to 1913 and was a governor of the exchange from 1907 to 1913. He was twice president of the village of South Orange, N.J., and delegate to the last state Republican convention.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels in and About Kingston Harbor.

The steamer War Horus was in port on Thursday morning, on her way from Port Arthur to Montreal. The vessel was recently turned out by the Port Arthur Shipbuilding Company.

M.T. Co's bulletin: The steamer Cataract arrived, light, from Montreal, and cleared for Port Colborne; the tug Thomson arrived from Montreal, with two light barges; the tug Clyde arrived, light, from Cornwall, and cleared with two grain barges for Montreal; the tug Laura Grace is due to arrive this morning with three light barges from Montreal, and will clear with the barge Orton for Oswego.

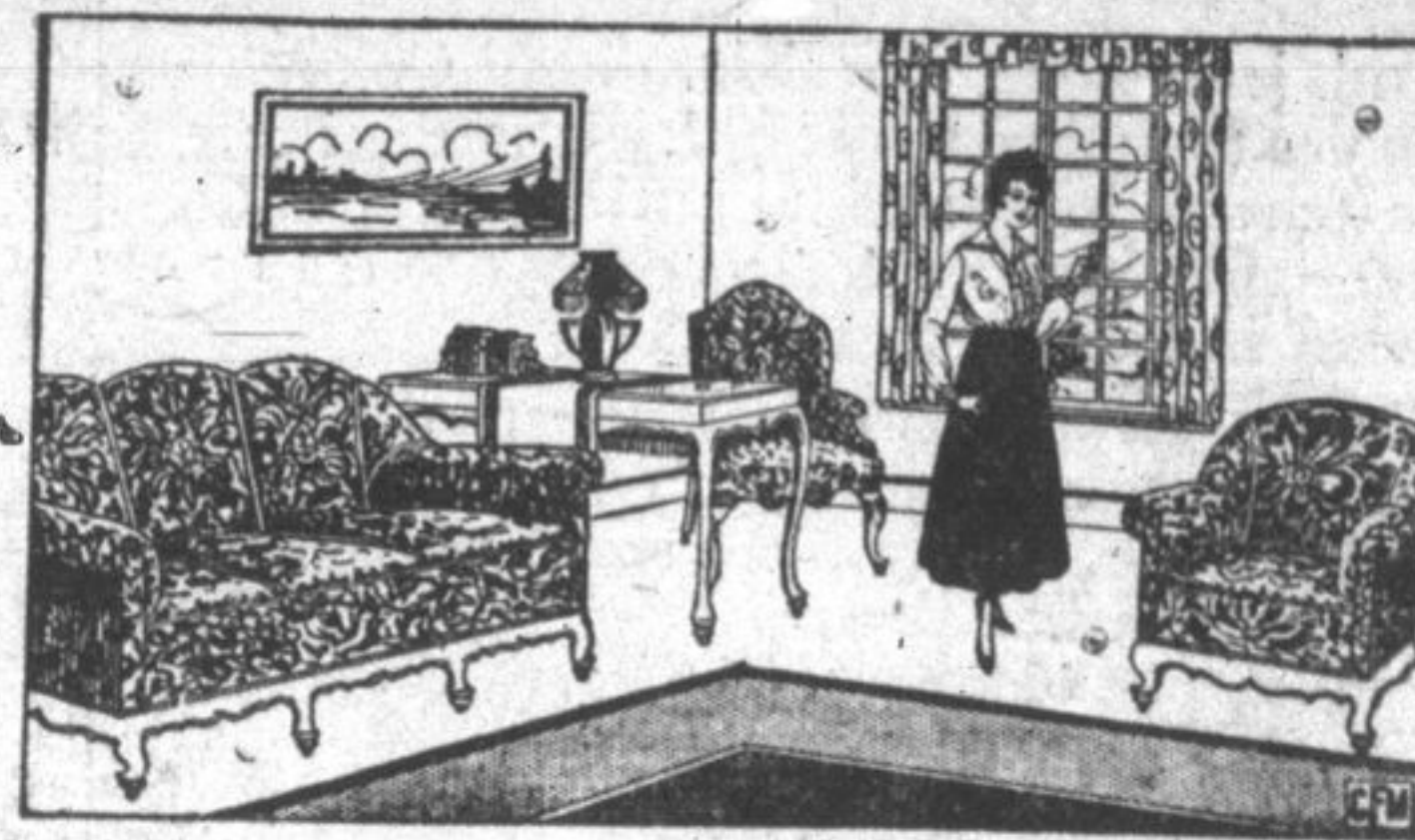
