MUST SURRENDER IN THREE DAYS

—Lend. Buy Victory Bonds— German Armistice Delegation Given Time If They Have Not Authority.

ARMISTICE MUST BE SIGNED BEFORE ANY SUSPENSION OF HOSTILITIES TAKES PLACE.

Marshal Foch Has Only Power to Deliver the Armistice Terms and Receive Their Acceptance. (Canadian Press Despatch) Washington, Nov. 8.—The German armistice delegation entered in the conference with Marshal Foch at 10 o'clock this morning (French time), it is announced officially today. Announcement was made also that if it is found the German delegates must refer the armistice terms to Berlin they will be given seventy-two hours from the time the decision is reached in which to answer.

Have Till Sunday.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Washington, Nov. 8.—Information reaching Washington through diplomatic channels to-day indicates that if the German armistice envoys are not ready to accept immediately the surrender terms offered by Marshal Foch, the marshal will give them only until Sunday to sign. An official diplomatic despatch from France to-day emphasized that Marshal Foch is empowered only to deliver the armistice terms to the Germans and receive their acceptance, and that peace negotiations are not the business of the military commander. Any suspension of hostilities before the armistice is signed, even if asked on philanthropic grounds, is declared to be out of the question.

Enemy Wireless Message.

Paris, Nov. 8.—The German wireless message asking for an armistice to meet Marshal Foch says: "The German Government would congratulate itself in the interests of humanity if the arrival of the German delegation on the Allied front might bring about a provisional suspension of hostilities." The German mission is headed by Matthias Erzberger, Secretary of State and head of the War Press Department, and includes Gen. H. K. A. von Winterfeldt, former military attaché at Paris; Count Alfred von Oberndorff, former Minister at Sofia; Gen. von Gruenell and Naval Captain von Salow.

THE WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF FORM

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pithy and Pointed Way.

F. R. McCurdy, M.P., has resigned as parliamentary under-secretary for Soldiers' and Sailors' Indemnity. Hungary has declared herself neutral in the threatened trouble between Germany and the Russian Bolshevik Government. The Germans tore down and melted the statue at Offenbourg of Sir Francis Drake, the English admiral who introduced the potato into England.

Former Speaker Cannon, of Illinois, was re-elected to what will be his twenty-second term in Congress, a record of service interrupted by only two defeats.

Word was received in Ottawa of the death at the Canadian Special Hospital in Buxton, England, of Lieut. Gordon Johnstone, a well-known Ottawa athlete.

Royal artillery and machine gun fire, which was particularly active in the region of Sedan, there has been little to report from the American battle front since Thursday night.

The Austrian Lloyd Shipping Company of Trieste is going into voluntary liquidation, according to the Berliner Tageblatt. This company lost in three years of the war 6,455,000 crowns.

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CUT RAILWAY INTO HAMBURG

—Lend. Buy Victory Bonds— Communications From North Are Broken By the German Revolutionists.

REVOLUTION CARRIED OUT IN A FAIRLY PEACEFUL MANNER, IT IS REPORTED.

The German Government Says One Squadron of the Navy Remains Faithful — Another Commune Joins the Revolution. (Canadian Press Despatch) London, Nov. 8.—The movement which resulted in the seizing of virtually the entire German navy and many cities by the revolutionaries was carried out in a fairly peaceful manner, according to an Exchange Telegraph correspondent at Copenhagen. The red flag was hoisted quite generally, he adds. All large wharves connected with the naval service were taken over by the revolutionists. At Wilhelmshaven, naval officers agreed to hand the authority over to the rebels if they would promise to make resistance should the British attack that naval port.

One Squadron Faithful.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Nov. 8.—A Berlin wireless despatch received here to-day says: "The third squadron remains faithful to the Government." The foregoing indicates a claim by the German authorities that part of the German navy has declined to join the revolutionaries.

Communications Cut.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Copenhagen, Nov. 8.—Revolutionists have cut the North German railway line south of Wismarburg in Schleswig-Holstein. This breaks communications from the north with Hamburg.

Kaiser's Abdication Likely Saturday

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Nov. 8.—German majority parties have held a final discussion on the question of Emperor William's abdication and will without doubt unanimously demand that he abdicate, according to a Berlin despatch to the Copenhagen Politikon. The abdication, it is added, will probably occur tomorrow.

PREMIER BORDEN OFF FOR ENGLAND

Lloyd-George Had Urged Him to Come Overseas at Once.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—It is understood that the Prime Minister will leave at an early date for England to take part in the preliminary discussions respecting the terms of peace and to represent Canada in connection with the peace conference. He will have the assistance and advice of Sir George Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and Hon. Arthur L. Sifton, Minister of Customs, who accompany him, and at a later date, Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, will proceed to England for the same purpose.

Lloyd Harris, chairman of the Canadian War Mission at Washington; Frank Jones, vice-chairman of the War Trade Board; Dr. James W. Robertson, C.M.G., representing the Department of Agriculture, and Col. O. M. Biggar, of the Department of Militia and Defence, and L. C. Christie, of the Department of External Affairs, will also accompany and assist the Prime Minister in his mission.

The Prime Minister and the Minister of Labor have conferred with the president of the Trades and Labor Congress as to the selection of a labor representative to accompany the Prime Minister, and P. M. Draper, secretary of the Trades and Labor Congress, has been selected for that purpose.

During Sir Robert Borden's absence, Sir Thomas White will be acting Prime Minister. The celebration of the fake report that the Germans had signed an armistice caused one death, the shooting of two and more or less serious injury of fourteen other persons when joyous crowds revelled in Philadelphia on Thursday. Frontenac Has Raised Over \$177,000—A Booth to be Opened in McAuley's Book Store. The amount added to the Victory Loan on Thursday in the city and county was \$91,550, making the total raised to date \$1,403,050. Of this amount the city has raised \$1,225,450, which has been contributed by 1,170 persons. These constitute the home battalion or reserves who support the army at the front with food, equipment and munitions, etc. Every day brings new recruits, as the following county report by townships shows:

Accidentally Shot.

Lindsay, Nov. 8.—A fatal accident befell William Brown, who lives at Manilla, while out shooting rabbits. He was walking along carrying his gun under his arm when he slipped and fell, discharging the gun. Walter Calford, who was talking to him just previous to the accident, and was on his way home when he heard the report of a gun, hurriedly retraced his steps and was shocked to find Mr. Brown lying prostrate and bleeding profusely from a large hole in his hip. Dr. Henderson, Cannington, was quickly on the scene, but Mr. Brown rapidly sank and died the same evening.

Chemical Expert Dies.

London, Nov. 8.—Lieut.-Col. Harrison, controller of the entire Department of Chemical Warfare, died on Thursday following an attack of pneumonia. He joined the army as a private in May, 1915, and immediately became connected with the Chemistry Research Bureau. He developed all the protective apparatus against gas attacks, and the whole organization has lately been in his hands. In this work he displayed brilliant resourcefulness.

GERMANY IS SHORN OF 5,500,000 MEN

The Enemy Casualties Since January Are Estimated at Over 2,250,000.

Paris, Nov. 8.—Pending the signing of an armistice with Germany what is the state of her army to-day? The following figures will no doubt, answer this. During the last six weeks 25 German divisions have been decimated. Five second class divisions, badly equipped, have been sent to the western front from Russia. The total deficit of German fighting units can safely be estimated at 5,500,000 men. The German 1920 class has been sent into the battle hurriedly to fill gaps.

THE ITALIAN BOOTY IS NOW FIVE BILLION

Stupendous Amount of War Equipage Left in Wake of Austrians.

Italian Headquarters in Eastern Italy, Nov. 8.—The Italian army is gathering in the booty of its great victory. The value of the captured material will eventually reach \$5,000,000,000, it is estimated. It now includes 200,000 horses and 6,000 guns.

By rough count 1,000,000 Austrian prisoners are now in Italian hands. It is said that the defeat of the Austrians in the last drive was ten times more costly to them than the defeat suffered at Caporetto last year was to the Italians.

Kaiser's Unpopularity.

"Should Be Sent to Helena," Says Berlin Poster. The Hague, Nov. 8.—Travellers from Germany confirm the unpopularity of the Hohenzollerns. One of these informants came from Berlin, where many disloyal bills are now posted.

The informant had seen bills declaring that "The Kaiser should be sent to St. Helena." "Down with the Hohenzollerns." "Long live the Social Revolution." and "Long live Liebknecht." One bill, representing a prisoner, bore the inscription: "Liebknecht should be liberated and his place taken by Kaiser Wilhelm."

To Cloud the Issue.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Paris, Nov. 8 (5:40 a.m.)—Texts of the wireless exchanges between Marshal Foch and the German high command shows signs, the morning newspapers declare, that Germany is still determined to cloud the issue in every possible way, apparently with the object of at least gaining time, if they cannot gain anything else. The Matin says: "Berlin and all Germany are striding rapidly toward revolution. The substitution of a responsible secretary of state for Admiral Von Hintze was inspired by this grave peril. ORDER GIVEN TO CEASE FIRE

To Permit the German Armistice Delegation to Approach French Lines.

ARRIVED NEAR LA CAPELLE

AND TAKEN TO A HOUSE PREPARED FOR THEM.

Proceeded on Their Journey to a Place in the Aisne Department Friday Morning to Meet Foch and Wemyss.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Paris, Nov. 8.—German delegates sent to the French front to receive from General Foch the terms for an armistice crossed the Allied lines late last night near La Capelle. They were taken to a house prepared for them, and stayed there during the night, and this (Friday) morning were conducted to a place in the department of the Aisne, which meeting place was fixed by General Foch. This trip took about four hours. Marshal Foch will have with him Admiral Sir Roslyn Wemyss, First Sea Lord of Great Britain, and Major-General Wygand of the French army.

German grand headquarters yesterday requested the Allied grand headquarters by wireless to permit the passage of the German delegation for armistice negotiations through the lines. The order was given to cease firing on the front at three o'clock yesterday, afternoon until further orders.

Germany's Admission.

Berlin, by wireless to London, Nov. 8.—"From the departure of our plenipotentiaries to the west front, it is concluded that formal development of armistice measures will follow shortly." It was officially announced here yesterday.

The above Berlin wireless was despatched before the armistice was signed, and indicates plainly that Germany had fully made up her mind to accept the Allied terms.

Succeeds Hon. T. W. Crothers as Minister of Labor.

(Ottawa, Nov. 8.—It was officially announced yesterday that Hon. T. W. Crothers, Minister of Labor, who is now en route for California, has handed his resignation to Sir Robert Borden, and that it has been accepted. Hon. Gideon Robertson, who has represented labor in the Cabinet for some time past, in addition to acting as chairman of the Canada Registration Board, has been appointed Minister in succession to Mr. Crothers, and was sworn in at noon yesterday. Mr. Crothers resigned on the grounds of ill-health.

GERMAN PRESS UNEASY.

Northcliffe's Peace Terms Worse Than Wilson's. Copenhagen, Nov. 8.—The German press is greatly exercised over the peace terms recently proposed by Viscount Northcliffe. Both the North German Gazette and the Berliner Tageblatt ask whether the Government associated with the United States accept President Wilson's peace programme, with which they declare, Viscount Northcliffe's proposals do not correspond.

Col. Hugh Clark's New Post.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—Two new appointments have been made by the Government: Col. Hugh Clark, M.P., parliamentary under-secretary for external affairs, becomes parliamentary under-secretary for the department of militia and defence. F. H. Keefer, M.P. (Port Arthur and Kenora), has been appointed parliamentary under-secretary for external affairs.

Cause of Prof. Dall's Death.

Miss Stewart, daughter of Postmaster James Stewart, received a letter Thursday morning from Mrs. John Dall, widow of Captain John Dall, who died in India on October 12th, giving a few particulars of his death. The late Captain Dall contracted some kind of throat trouble, tuberculosis developed, and he died two weeks later. He was buried at Secunderabad, India.

It is definitely understood that New Zealand will be represented at the peace conference.

HAMBURG FLIES THE RED FLAG

Great German Maritime Port in Hands of Revolutionists.

OTHER GERMAN CITIES JOIN IN THE REVOLUTION WHICH WILL SWEEP COUNTRY.

Dr. Karl Liebknecht is Said to Have Arranged for the Formation of a Soldiers' Council at Bremen. (Canadian Press Despatch) Amsterdam, Nov. 8.—The great German maritime port of Hamburg is completely in the hands of the revolutionists, according to reports from Hamburg newspapers, printed by the Cologne Gazette. The red flag is flying on all ships in the harbor. The headquarters of the commander of the port has been occupied by the Soldiers' Council after exciting occurrences in which machine guns were used. All kinds of excesses took place in the neighboring city of Altona. The port commander there agreed to all the demands submitted by the Soldiers' Council.

More German Cities Join.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Nov. 8 (9:36 a.m.)—The cities of Bremen, Schwerin and Tilsit have joined in the German revolution, according to a Copenhagen despatch. Dr. Karl Liebknecht is said to have arranged for the formation of a Soldiers' Council at Bremen.

Fired on the Prince.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Copenhagen, Nov. 8.—Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of Emperor William, left Kiel on Wednesday in an automobile flying a red flag. He was pursued by marines, who fired a dozen shots at him.

PROHIBITION MAKES GAINS IN STATES

Four New States of Union Are Added to the List of the "Drys."

Washington, Nov. 8.—Prohibition was a big issue at the polling in a number of states where state prohibition, the ratification of the federal measure, of amendments to existing temperance laws were before the electors. Four states, and possibly a fifth, were added to the list of those in which the sale of liquor is forbidden. While all the returns are not in, the latest reports indicate that Ohio, Wyoming, Minnesota and Florida have gone dry. Nevada, which also voted on the question, has not reported the result as yet.

Temperance leaders believe that federal prohibition is assured within a year, and that when wartime prohibition comes into force, July 1st next, the federal amendment will be carried soon after. Federal prohibition has been approved by thirteen states, six of which are "wet," and in no state has it been defeated. One of the issues in a great many states was the election of a legislature that would ratify the federal amendment. When thirty-six state legislatures have ratified this the whole United States will become "bone dry." With four states adopting prohibition on Monday, twenty-seven having already carried the state measure, and six wet states also having approved the federal amendment, prohibition as a federal law is regarded as a matter of months.

To Resign from Parliament. Toronto, Nov. 8.—Thomas Power, M.P., it is said, has decided to resign his seat in Parliament and confine his public endeavors to municipal affairs. He has already announced that he will run for mayor.

Senator Lagroix introduced a resolution in the French Upper House, Thursday afternoon, extending the thanks of the country to Marshal Foch and Premier Clemenceau. This is the first time that similar action has been taken since the time of Napoleon Bonaparte.

Montreal churches re-opened Thursday after the epidemic. The theatres will open next Monday.

WAR BULLETINS.

- German's U-boat crews have mutinied. Thus almost the entire German fleet is now in revolt. More than one hundred shells were released Thursday by the advancing French army. German Field Marshal Mackensen requested permission for his army to pass through Hungary and was informed it would be granted, which was done.
