

VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN

A CANADIAN FLAVOR IS ON THE VICTORY BONDS.

Design is Artistic and Symbolic—Printing 2,500,000 Copies—Credit to All Concerned. One of the most highly technical processes of manufacture in Canada is that of bank note making. Skill of the highest order must be employed not only to turn out a creditable and attractive note, but to insure that every precaution is taken to render the operation of counterfeiting practically impossible.

Making 2,500,000 Bonds. The number of bonds being printed is 2,500,000, which is an increase over a year ago when 1,800,000 were run off the presses. There are but two periods, five and fifteen years. Last year there were five, ten and twenty-year bonds. The bonds are of four denominations. The \$50 bonds are printed in blue; the \$100 in green; the \$500 in olive and the \$1,000 in brown. The size is about half that of last year.

The Late Dr. T. H. Balfe.

One of Hamilton's leading physicians passed away on Wednesday in the person of Dr. Thomas Hugh Balfe, after an illness of two weeks, from influenza. PICTURE FOUND ON SOLDIERS' BODY.



A member of the 9th Field Battalion, who found a little packet of photographs beside the body of an unidentified soldier on the battlefield, has sent the pictures to a friend in Hudson, Quebec, in the hope that they may be recognized and claimed. On the postcard photograph, shown above, are the lines "With love from Nellie." The picture is dated September 18, 1914. A private of the 2nd Canadian Battalion appears in two photographs. In one picture he is standing beside a private, probably of the 14th Canadian Battalion; in the other picture he is shown alone. Among the pictures is one of a boy, about twelve years old, inscribed "With best love to my dear brother George from Fred." On the reverse side of the card, the message reads: "With love from Fred. We have not had any raids for a long time." The likeness of a girl, about twenty years old, may prove a clue to identification. She appears alone, and also with a Canadian private. Another photograph of a girl, probably in her teens, is marked "Miss Dorothy Tuck, 67 Blenheim, Hazel, Wellington, Surrey." Two names are written on the back of a post-card photograph of a Canadian private: Pte. S. A. Truman, 2nd Battalion, and Pte. G. S. H. Tuck, 2nd Battalion. There are eight photographs in the packet.
