On the postcard photograph, shown above, are the lines "With love from Nellie," The pict-. ure is dated September 16, 1914. A private of the 2nd Canadian Battalion appears in two photographs. In one picture he is standing beside a private, probably of the 14th Canadian Battalian; in the other picture he is shown alone. Among the pictures is one of a boy, about twelve years old, inscribed "With best love to my dear brother George from Fred." On the reverse side of the card, the message reads. "With love from Fred. We have not had any raids for a long time." The likeness of a girl, about twenty years old. may prove a clue to identification. She appears alone, and also with a Canadian private. Another photograph of a girl, probably in her teens is marked, "Miss Dorothy Tuck, 67 Blenheim, Rozel, Wallington, Surrey."
