Absolute Surrender By Germany

Ex-Kaiser in Holland

War Ended at 6 O'clock Monday Morning --- The Period Given for the Evacuation of the Left Bank of the Rhine by German Forces Extended Twenty-four Hours.

Washington, Nov. 11.—2.45 a.m.—The armistice with Germany was signed at 5 o'clock, Paris time, this morning. The world war will end this morning at six o'clock Washington time, or 11 o'clock Paris time.

This announcement was made verbally by an official of the State Department in this form: "The armistice has been signed. It was signed at five o'clock a.m. Paris time, and hostilities will cease at 11 o'clock this morning, Paris time." The terms of the armistice, it was announced, will not be made public until later.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The world war ended at six o'clock this morning, (Ontario time) with red revolution in Germany and with William Hohenzollern, former Emperor, a fugitive from his native land.

London, Nov. 11.—10.45 a.m.—The period given for the evacuation of the left bank of the Rhine by German forces has been extended by twenty-four hours, according to French wireless despatch.

London, Nov. 11.—The former German Emperor's party, which is believed to include Field Marshal von Hindenburg, arrived at Eysden, on the Dutch frontier at 7.30 o'clock on Sunday morning, according to the Daily Mail advices. Practically the whole German general staff, accompanied by the former Emperor and ten automobiles carried the party. The automobiles were bristling with rifles, and all the fugitives were armed.

The ex-Kaiser was in uniform. He alighted at Eysden station and paced the platform, smoking a cigarette. The former Emperor did not look in the least distressed.

London, Nov. 11.—4.45 a.m.—The arrival of William Hohenzollern, the former German Emperor, with his wife and eldest son, has caused excitement and much uneasiness among the Dutch authorities, and the public of that country, says a despatch to the Telegraph from Rotterdam. It is unofficially stated that the refugees did not obtain authorization from Holland to enter the country, and crossed the frontier in the neighborhood of Eysden because the Dutch neutrality guards were weak at that point.

Copenhagen, Nov. 11.—A neutral who left Berlin on Friday says that the revolution was spreading in Germany without any possibility of preventing the movement. The Government knew it and wisely was not trying to suppress it by force. The end of the old regime was taken for granted and the Reichstag was preparing to take the Government in its own hands.

Copenhagen, Nov. 11.—Hesse-Darmstadt has declared itself a free socialist republic until a German republic is established. The garrison at Dresden is in the hands of the provisional soldiers' and workmen's council.

New York, Nov. 11.—The Associated Press this morning issues the following: After 1,567 days of horror, during which virtually the whole civilized world has been convulsed, the greatest war in history ended this morning at six o'clock, Ontario time. The terms dictated by Marshal Foch are believed to be of such a nature as to protect the world from a resumption of the struggle by the Germans. It is assumed that they call for the demobilization of Germany's army, the surrender of part of her fleet and the dismantling of the rest.

The terse announcement of the state department did not tell anything of the scene at Marshal Foch's headquarters at the time the armistice was signed. It was stated, however, that at five o'clock, Paris time, the signatures of Germany's delegates were affixed to the document which blasted for ever dreams which embroiled the world in a struggle which has cost at the very lowest estimate ten million lives.
