### LECTURE ON "HEREDITY"

IN CONNECTION WITH THE COURSE IN SOCIAL SERVICE.

Prof. H. Michell Deals With the Transmission of Good, and Bad Characteristics in Human Beings.

The second lecture in the Queen's University course in Social Service was delivered by Prof. H. Michell on Thursday night, the subject being "Heredit." Starting with a brief outline of the labors of Mendel, Galton and other scientists in the field of eugenics, the lecturer went on to a consideration of the practical application of the Mendelian theory of the transmission of good and bad characteristics in human beings. By means of diagrams, it was shown how both feeble-mindedness, criminality and physical and mental defects may be transmitted from generation to generation, and some grave statistics were given of actual families which have for a century and a half given the worst type of citizen to the state. One notorious instance was that of the "Jukes" family, a strain in the United States which has been investigated and whose unhappy characteristics have been noted. The history of the Jukes family is a dismal recital of criminality, feeble-mindedness, pauperism, immortality and every anti-social trait. It has been estimated that this family alone has cost the state of New York over two millions of dollars, and the history of the tragedy has not been reached yet.

On the other side were given instances of the transmission from generation to generation of the highest qualities of citizenship and mental capacity, as for instance in the Darwin, where great scientific ability has been handed on from father to son for four generations. The lesson to be learned from this was quite apparent, the duty of the state in preventing the propagation of unsound stocks, by restraining feeble-minded persons from marriage, making them wards of the state in hospitals and institutions designed for their care. The task of eugenic science is to bring home to the public the truth that prevention is better than cure, and that to take measures calculated to prevent the presence of unsound members of society is better than to keep up hospitals, lunatic asylums, penitentiaries and all the costly paraphernalia with which the state now attempts, with very little success, to stem the tide of criminality.

### LAUNCHING OF TRAWLER.

Bottle of Champagne Broken by Mrs. John Sowards.

A very successful launching ceremony took place at the Collingwood Shipbuilding Yard at three o'clock on Thursday afternoon when the trawler T.R.57, built by the company for the British Naval Department, left the stocks. A large crowd assembled in the shipbuilding yard and on the adjoining wharves to witness the proceedings. A platform was erected alongside the bows of the vessel, and promptly to time the party arrived there. On the platform were Mayor Hughes, Rev. R. J. Wilson, H. C. Welch, general manager, and J. F. McMillan, secretary-treasurer of the company, and a few of the directors and their friends. The ceremony was gracefully performed by Mrs. John Sowards. With much hammering, the last remaining supports were knocked away, and the vessel glided into the water, just as Mrs. Sowards broke a bottle of champagne on the bows, amidst the cheers of the large crowd. J. F. McMillan presented Mrs. Sowards with a beautiful bouquet of roses.

After the ceremony the party adjourned to the office of the company, where H. C. Welch, on behalf of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company, thanked Mrs. Sowards for the graceful manner in which she performed the launching of the ship, and presented her with a bracelet watch. Mr. Sowards made a suitable reply.

The T.R.57 is the last of eight trawlers which the company has built for the British Government. The last one to be launched was taken over and manned by the United States. These vessels are 125 feet long, and are used for patrol work, and also for mine-laying and sweeping. Now that hostilities have come to an end, it is not known what use will be made of them.

The Socialist Vorwarts, of Berlin, describes the armistice conditions as "terrible," but adds: "The treaties have been signed and must be executed by the new Government."

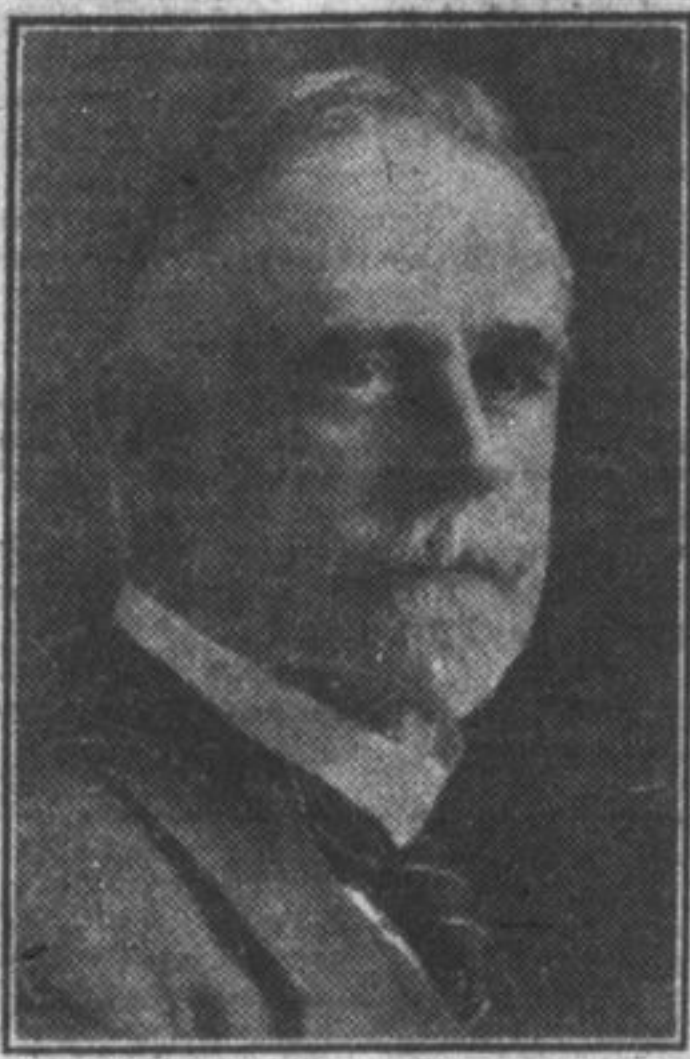

And every mother who has lost a loved one in this great war has something of this feeling to express. All honor to the Kingston mothers who have given of their best in this Titanic struggle. There is no honor too high for them. In our rejoicing over the news of approaching peace, we should not forget the women at home, who have played such a great part in this struggle. They have suffered in silence.

Canada has paid the price with the flower of its manhood, but it has been worth while, as humanity is to be benefited thereby through the ages to come. It is all wonderful, even in the face of all the tragedy that has been enacted in the awful war.
