In regard to destroyers, Germany in 1914 possessed 133 of these vessels, with no modern torpedo vessels. The number of these which have been sunk cannot for the present be accurately computed, but it can safely be said that more than half of the destroyer flotillas have been sent to the bottom. A most significant fact is that, although at the outbreak of war she had only forty-eight submarines built or building, she has since los: over 150, and still has more than 160 left to hand over to the Allies. The Allies' Council is taking no chances, but has demanded that every submarine (the vessel on which Germany pinned her whole faith) must be given up.

The naval terms are such as to cusure that never again will the German navy be able to even challenge Britain's supremacy of the seas. By these terms Germany's sea power is definitely ended, and her ships will never again be a menace to the freedom of the seas.
