## KINGSTON AND VICTORY DAY

THE CITIZENS ROSE TO THE GLORIOUS OCCASION.

The Writer Describes the Scenes Witnessed Here—The 20th Century Resurrection Came to Kingston.

"Sorrow may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning." Early in the morning, while it was yet dark, on the pover-to-be-forgotten eleventh of November, nineteen hundred and eighteen, the glad tidings of the world's new hope, the 20th century resurrection, came to Kingston. While men slept the angel came and rolled away the stone that sealed our sacred things through the long and weary period while Right seemed on the scaffold and Wrong upon the throne, and the risen Prince of Peace walked forth a conqueror. Historic old Kingston rose to the glorious comprehension of the part and lot she had in this great matter, made possible by the service and sacrifice of her noble sons and daughters, rose also to a clearer vision of the Ruling Hand by which all this had been wrought.

At the break of day hundreds of grateful and chastened citizens made their way to the grand old building on the market square that has been the scene of so many thanksgivings for national and civic blessings, but never a greater or deeper one than this, to return heartfelt praise to Him who had crowned His manifold favors by this unspeakable gift—peace on earth, O, the thrill of it! O, the tempered pride and gratitude in being allowed to live our lives in such a period of the world's history, even to have lived on such 11th of November! Can we ever forget! No; we will go back instead to walk our daily and humble rounds resolved to make all things for the remainder of life's tray—according to the pattern shown us on that mount—by the grace of Him who will strengthen us. Let us see we keep faith with our martyrs.

The next scene in a natural sequence carries us to the brave, the broken; the fearless and the true, to the men and women of vision who seeing this day afar off through the four years of sorrow's reign—faced for us, and see that vision were enabled to count all things else as naught that they might bring

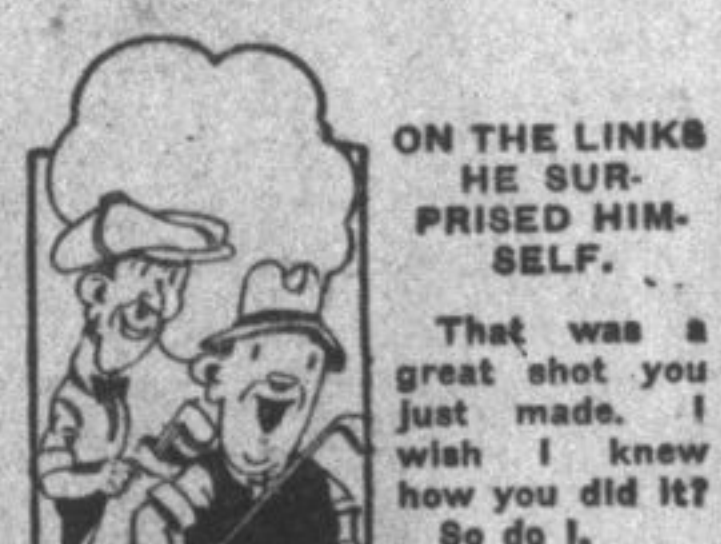

its realization near to us in the light of which we will build well and truly on the sure and costly foundation they laid.

They climbed the dizzy steps to heaven,  
Through peril, toil and pain;  
God grant to us that grace be given

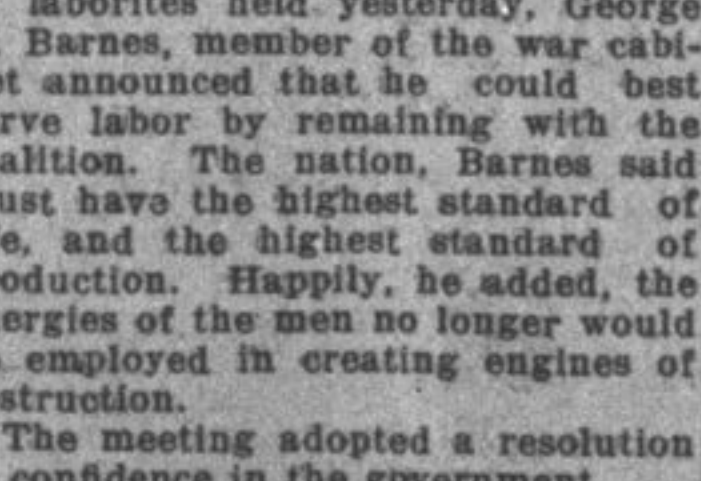
## BARNES WILL REMAIN

### PRINCE ALEXANDER

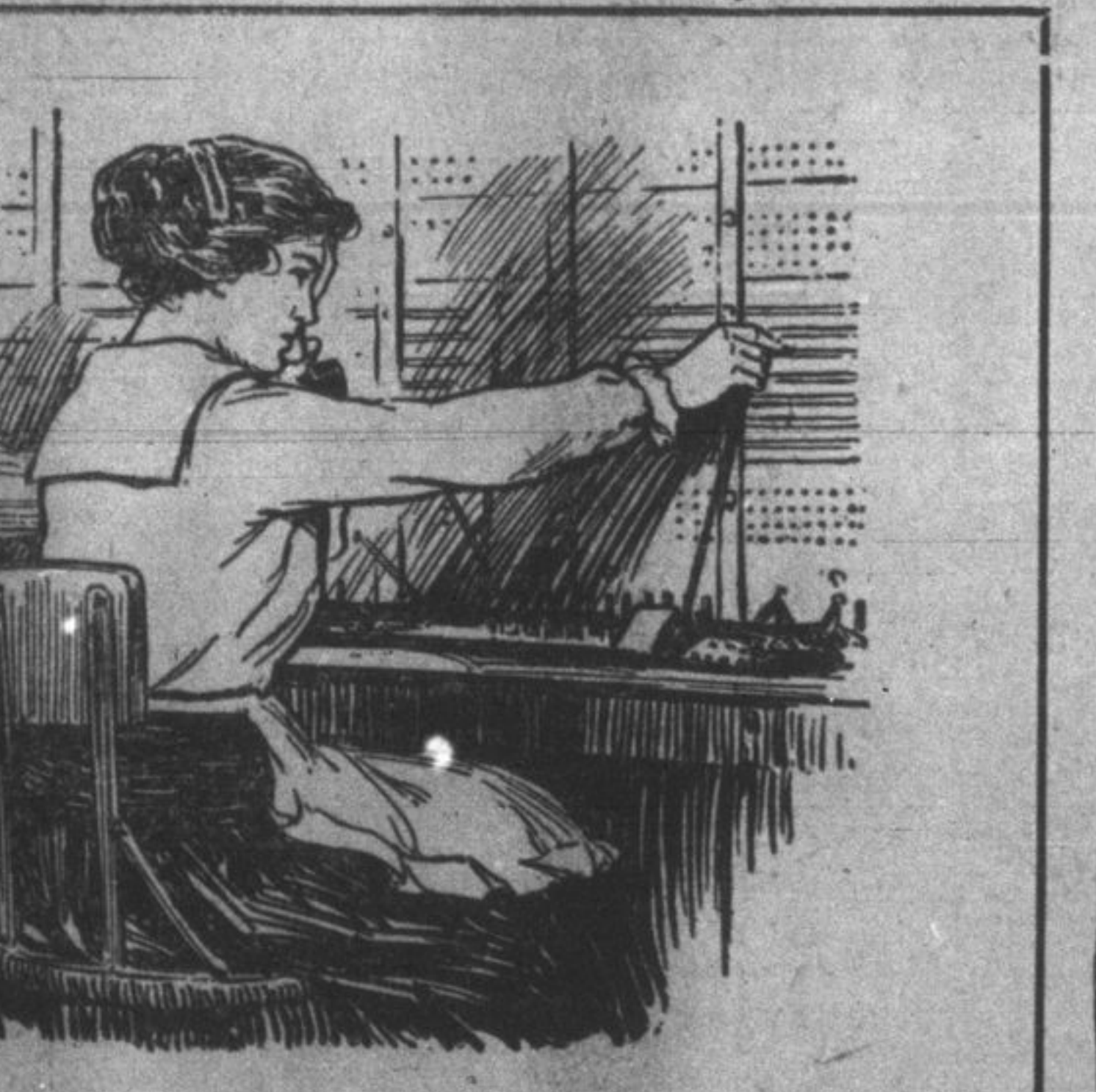


SERBIAN AND ALLIED TROOPS ENTERED MONASTIR

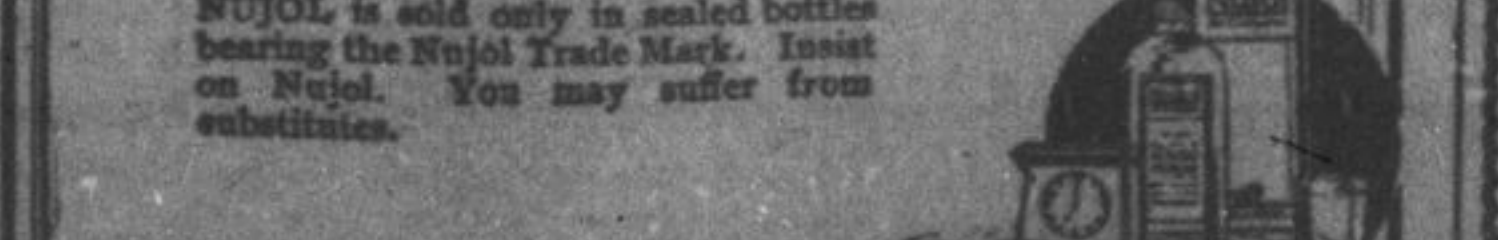
