**VETERANS SEEK REPLIES**

**FROM THE GOVERNMENT AS TO LAND SETTLEMENT**

They Are Determined that the Returned Soldier Shall Have A Square Deal In This Matter. The Great War Veterans' Association is actively engaged in demanding that the Government's land settlement scheme for returned soldiers be thoroughly investigated and some drastic changes made. The Kingston branch has passed a resolution heartily endorsing the policy of the Dominion executive, and has expressed itself as in favor of sending a demonstration to Ottawa to put their demands before the Government. A letter has been sent to the authorities asking for definite replies to the following questions.

Will the Government consider the possibility of state expropriation, by fixed schedule, which will eliminate all speculative values and will not impose onerous burdens, either on the cultivator who works the land or the general community?

Does the Government intend to buy at the public expense such land as private speculators are willing to dispose of, as prices out of proportion to their "prairie values"?

Will the Government, falling other measures, consider the passing of legislation whereby all idle agricultural lands, if not brought under cultivation within a definite period (say ten years) will revert to the Crown?

Does the Government, while demanding that men must give their services for a daily wage often far below their earning capacities in civil life, propose that land shall continue to be widely held on terms which enable the holders to exact extravagant toll from the producers, particularly the returned soldiers, who seek to rejoin their ranks?

The veterans are in dead earnest over the question of land settlement, which they consider one of the most vital problems arising out of demobilization, and are determined that the returned soldier shall have a square deal in this matter.

**Military Matters**

Lieut. Col. R. K. Barker, officer commanding the 2nd Canadian Garrison Regiment, has been appointed to the staff of the A.A.G. at district headquarters, Ottawa. Col. Barker, who is the permanent inspector of cadets, organized and took over the 5th Battalion.

Gunner E. C. Stillwell, Depot Field Battery, has proceeded on command to the Ontario Agricultural College, Add military.

The Military 'Y' was crowded on Tuesday to hear a lecture on the sex problem by Dr. O. C. J. Withrow, M.R.C.S. (Eng.), illustrated by splendid motion pictures. The first reel showed the medical and surgical causations and results of venereal disease. The other three reels were entitled "Fit to Fight," and showed how various recruits in the citizen army met the temptations which came before them. The whole tone of the programme is to emphasize the value of clean, moral living, rather than to exploit preventive treatment.

**TO PUT INTO EXECUTION**

The Plans for Demobilization of Troops At Once.

The demobilization of Canadian troops is to be proceeded with, and Brig-Gen. Hemming, C.M.G., held a conference of the officers commanding the various units in the district Tuesday with a view to putting into immediate execution plans for the carrying out of the same.

General Hemming addressed the officers who had served so faithfully since the war began, informing them of the spirit and letter of the order, and requesting the utmost despatch in the carrying out of all measures to be adopted for the purpose of demobilization. He impressed upon all the necessity for the utmost co-operation, and said that this would be expected of every officer.

The following draft producing units will be immediately disbanded: Artillery depot, Engineer depots (including signal and railway troops), Depot battalions, C.A.S.C. overseas detachment, machine gun depot, C.O.T.C., or university companies, tank battalions reinforcements.

The following units will be maintained, but will be reduced to a minimum consistent with efficiency: Headquarters and district staffs; artillery as required for defence; engineers as required for defence and maintenance; the C. G. R.; medical and dental services; C. A. S. C.; C. O. C.; A. C. A. V. C.; pay services; chaplains in accordance with reduction of the force; the clearing services command and district depots for overseas demobilization in accordance with requirements. Cavalry depot squadrons, R.C.D. L.S.H., and F.G.H. C. M. P. C. will be maintained in accordance with instructions.
