

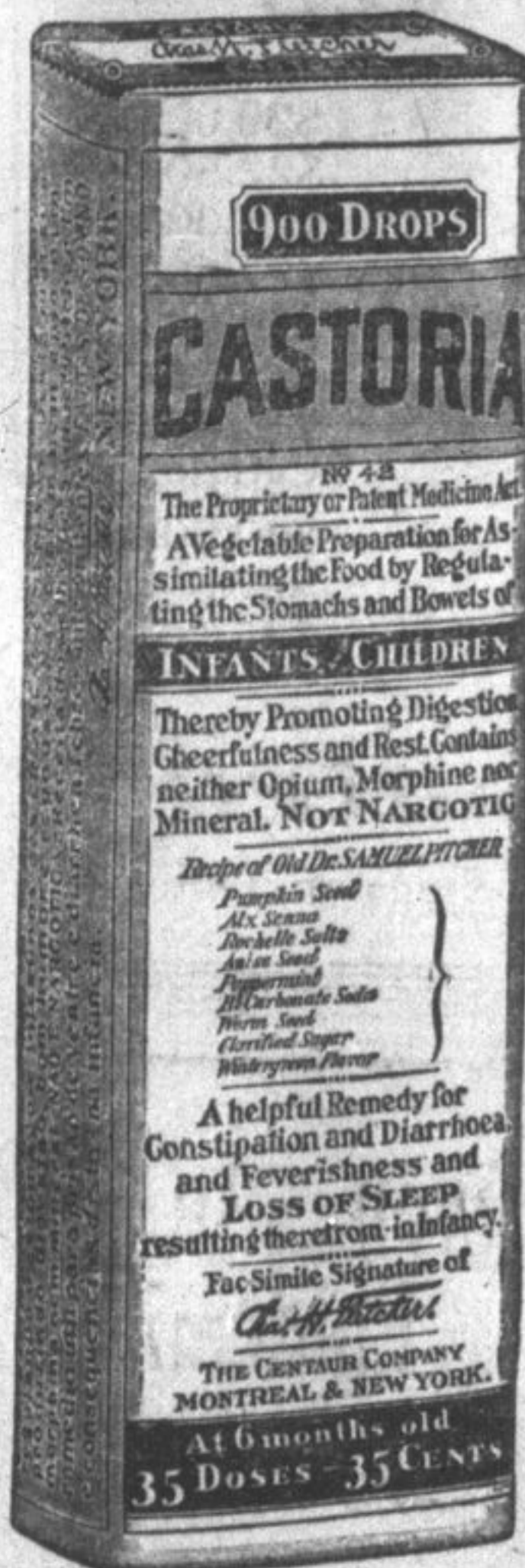

VALUE OF MUTUAL HELP

A SERMON PREACHED BY REV. J. D. ELLIS.

"God Pity the Men Who Cry Down and Not Up"—Says the Lonely and Depressed Men "Be of Good Courage."

Rev. J. D. Ellis spoke on Sunday in Sydenham street Methodist church on "The Value of the Christian Church." He based his remarks on Isaiah xli. 6: "They helped every man his neighbor and every one said to his brother be of good courage."

This is a picture of mutual helpfulness and mutual encouragement, said the preacher. In civilized communities we need the help of others. Independence is a sign of savagery, dependence is a sign of civilization. The Red Indian can catch his own food and cook it. He can build his own wigwam and make his own clothes. And he wants nothing else. Civilized people are not so. We call to all lands and all people for help in the thousand-fold wants of our developed nations. Governments compel us to help each other in roads, sidewalks, sewers, schools, post offices and all such things. We join for mutual help in syndicates, corporations, companies and such to accomplish what one cannot do alone.

The church of God is the most important institution in civilization. It exceeds in value, post offices, railroads, banks, factories or any other product of modern commerce. It gives a value to property. It lowers taxes, it exalts ideals. It creates an atmosphere that makes for manhood and citizenship.

Gladstone said, "I would rather have one minister of the gospel than ten policemen for safeguarding any community." John A. Macdonald said, "The world owes more for its civilization to ministers of the gospel than to ministers of the crown." A judge in New York said, "I have been five years on the bench. I have tried over four thousand cases and I have never yet convicted a man of a crime who was an active member in any Christian church." A boy came to Winnipeg eight years ago and went wrong through vice. In a short time he died through disipation.

Before death a minister led him in penitence to God. After the boy's funeral the father of the boy visited the minister and said, "It was all my fault. In our home we scoffed at the Bible, the church and religion. And he came to this city without any anchor to hold him. We are now ruined and disgraced. But you have done for him what I can never repay. From henceforth I will give my life and my all to the church and the service it gives to the world."

"When this passing world is done When has sunk your glowing sun When I stand with Christ in glory Looking o'er life's finished story Then 'Lord, shall I fully know, Not till then, how much I owe."

This brings us now to the question, what help do we give? The real helpers carry the cross often on the fingers of our two hands. There is the help need for the choir by those entrusted with the talent of music. In the Sabbath school by those who can teach. In prayer and service for evangelization. In making the church a centre of social, intellectual and spiritual activity such as will produce a community safe for democracy. In giving of our wealth for its adequate support and the propagation of the Gospel to all the world. These are the obligations of every man.

Added to mutual help is mutual encouragement. The toilers grow discouraged. It calls for all the cheer and optimism of which we are capable. Some may not be able to help much, but all can speak the glad word. Give it to the choir on the Sunday school staff, the mission workers, the minister, to all. Don't throw "wet blankets." God pity the men who cry down and not up. Say to toiling, lonely depressed men everywhere "Be of good courage."

HEALTH TALK

SPANISH INFLUENZA OR GRIP

FOR EIGHTY-FIVE RETURNED SOLDIERS IN THIS DISTRICT

During the Past Month by the Soldiers' Aid Commission—More Consideration From Employers is Necessary.

During the last month the Soldiers' Aid Commission found positions for eighty-five soldiers in this military district, under satisfactory conditions at a good living wage. The superintendent of the branch seeks more co-operation from the employers reporting back to the commission about the men they take on their staffs. As an example, it is stated that only thirty-two reports were received of the men placed last month, although forty-five others went to good positions.

From the superintendent's statement, it appears that employers are not so eager as they should be in giving a trial to the returned men who have been given vocational and re-educational courses at the schools conducted in connection with convalescent institutions. Positions of light labor for men who have suffered physical disability are hard to find. Five men sent out to positions during the last month have had to give them up because of their weakened strength.

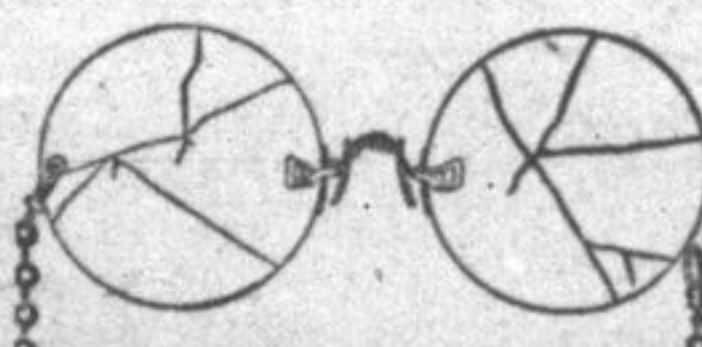
