### INDUCTION AT COOKE'S INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

OF THE REV. W. TAYLOR DALE LOCAL NOTES AND ITEMS OF WEDNESDAY EVENING. GENERAL INTEREST.

Rev. J. D. Boyd, Presided—Rev. Profs. Scott and Jordan and Rev. Dr. Macgillivray Delivered the Addresses.

An impressive ceremony took place in Cooke's Presbyterian church on Wednesday evening, when Rev. W. Taylor Dale, formerly of Toronto, was inducted into the pastorate of that church. Rev. J. D. Boyd, moderator pro-tem, presided. A large congregation was present.

A splendid sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Scott, of Queen's University, who spoke of the close relationship between the home and the nation. He spoke of the sanctity of the home ties, and the sacredness of home life. The life of the nation demands on the nature of the homes of the nation. He referred to the clashing of ideas of the older generation with those of the younger generation that is growing up. It was necessary for parents to show much sympathy and forbearance with their children. He also urged the children to turn their hearts towards their elders. The young people are impatient of anything which was not begun yesterday. Their minds could not conceive the worth of the great truths that have been handed down from generation to generation. In conclusion, he spoke of the great work of the ministry, and of the great responsibility it entailed in these days. He expressed the hope that the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Dale would be a most happy and fruitful one.

Dr. H. T. Wallace, presbytery clerk pro tem, then gave a brief sketch of the circumstances leading up to the induction, and called upon the moderator to proceed with the induction ceremony. The service was performed by the Rev. J. D. Boyd.

Rev. Dr. Macgillivray addressed the newly-inducted pastor. He spoke of the great importance of religion in life, and on the great tasks which confronted the ministers of the church. He said that the man who really preaches for the times, preaches for eternity and is a tremendous power in the life of the church and had a great power over his fellow men.

Prof. W. G. Jordan delivered the address to the congregation, and spoke briefly upon the necessity of upholding the minister of all times, and urged the congregation to support their new minister and to cooperate with him to the fullest possible extent.

D. A. Shaw, session clerk, read the following telegram, received from the Rev. E. R. MacLean, Vancouver, B.C., on Wednesday. "Heartiest congratulations and best wishes to minister and people that the kingdom may be greatly extended in the lives of young and old, and that all may really make the church great through service in this new day of peace. Is the prayer of your former pastor and friends, Rev. and Mrs. E. R. MacLean."

The service was closed with the benediction, pronounced by Rev. Dr. Ross.

**NO LONGER GET HUFFY.**

Rev. Dr. Wilson Speaks in Ottawa of Women's Work.

Rev. Dr. E. J. Wilson, of Chalmers church, Kingston, was one of the chief speakers at the Forward Movement conference in Ottawa this week. The Ottawa Citizen says:

"Speaking of the reconstruction period and women's part in church forward movement, Dr. Wilson said: 'Before the war, did you ever know of twenty women gathering together in an organization who couldn't raise a first class war among themselves in an hour and a quarter? The war has taught them that they can gather and work for the boys in the trenches and they haven't time to get sore or huffy, the war was going on. The result is that there is a record of the women's work during the last four years that is the brightest page in the history of the world.' He believed in burying all organizations that were dead, if only for sanitary reasons.

**TO STIR UP TRADE WITH OVERSEAS FIRMS**

Representative of Department of Overseas Trade Is in the City.

Kingston has an interesting visitor in the person of Frederick W. Field, who is representing the department of overseas trade. His visit here is in regard to after-the-war construction of trade, and it is his desire to meet manufacturers' agents and importers who desire to establish connection now with British firms.

Among other things, it is also his desire to secure samples of German or Austrian goods sold in Ontario before the war. It is understood that some fine samples of pottery are to be given to Mr. Field in Kingston, and no doubt there will be other interesting samples. The scheme is one of co-operation between British and Canadian firms.

**The Handling Of Fish.**

E. O. Sawyer, Jr., of the fish section of the Canada Food Board was in the city Wednesday in consultation with the civic officials, Board of Trade and fish dealers in regard to the placing of sea fish on the market. He says the accommodation for the sale is first-class and distribution to all points in this district very easy of accomplishment. He says cod, haddock, soles and flounders, fresh or fresh frozen, could be sold here at 15c. and under per pound.

The Secretary of State wishes to express the desire of the Government that Sunday next, the first of December, shall be observed as a day of thanksgiving. The Government's call to worship should imply every loyal Kingstonian to be found in church on Sunday morning.
