"EXPERIENCE" AT GRAND

THIS STRONG PLAY TO BE GIVEN AGAIN TONIGHT.

Made Great Impression on a Large Audience on Wednesday Night—It Drives Home a Lesson With Telling Effect.

A play that drives home a lesson with trip hammer force. Such is "Experience," by George V. Hobart, presented at the Grand on Wednesday night, before a large audience, and which will be given again tonight. "Experience" played here before, and made a great name, but the production as given on Wednesday night is even still stronger than on its initial appearance and made a great impression on the audience. Costumes and very rich settings give it the up-to-date appearance, and the experience of Youth, as he starts out on his first episode, "In the Land Where Dreams Begin," until the tenth and final one, "In the Land Where the Dreamers Awake," carries the audience every stage of the way. It is a strong play, given by able people, for there is not one weak character in the cast. For those who do not believe in the educational powers of the stage, "Experience" must surely be an "eye-opener." Almost every factor in life is represented, and with telling effect. Those taking part in this drama of life do not appear as acting their part; they are living it.

It would take much space to tell the story of Youth, as he goes through his life of folly and false pleasures, until he reaches the Kingdom of True Happiness. There he is the finished actor, and did ample justice to the part. Next to Youth, the most outstanding role is that of Experience, and it is taken by Duncan Penwarden in a most creditable manner. Possessed of a good voice, and a strong personality, he puts everything into his part. It is impressive, and in this he succeeds. Floy Murray, as Love, and May McManus, as Hope, were most charming. Guy Collins, as Ambition, gave a strong portrayal of the part, and also made good in two other roles, that of Work and Law, the policeman. Under ordinary circumstances, Work would not make a great hit with many people, but Guy Collins had a line of "dope" that made it look worth while.

"Experience" is to be given again tonight at the Grand, and every Kingstonian who has not had the opportunity of seeing it should take it in.

NEWS FROM SIBERIA.

The Advance Party Had Stormy Passage to Vladivostok.

Letters have just been received from members of the advance party of the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force which sailed from Vancouver on Oct. 11th and arrived in Vladivostok on Oct. 26th. The voyage was extremely stormy and rough and was made directly to Vladivostok by the northern route and without calling at Japanese ports. Letters written on November 1st stated that the weather was fine and warm and like a day in September here. The city was then filled with refugees from the interior of Russia, most of whom seemed to be destitute. Quarters had been secured for the hospital in very good buildings and cleaning up was in progress. The hospital was taken over from the Russians. Civilians will be cared for in the Canadian institution. The place is some distance from the city, but is accessible as the tram cars run in front of the doors. Vladivostok looks good. It has fine business houses, public buildings and residences.

Vaccinating Against Black Leg.

Cattle throughout the county are suffering from black leg, and Dr. G. W. Bell is engaged every day in vaccinating dairy herds. The disease first shows its presence by lameness in one leg, which is soon followed by swelling, and it rapidly spreads all through the animal's body, resulting fatally within a few days. There is really no cure for this disease, but vaccination is used as a preventative measure and is a pronounced success. The animal should be vaccinated both spring and fall.
