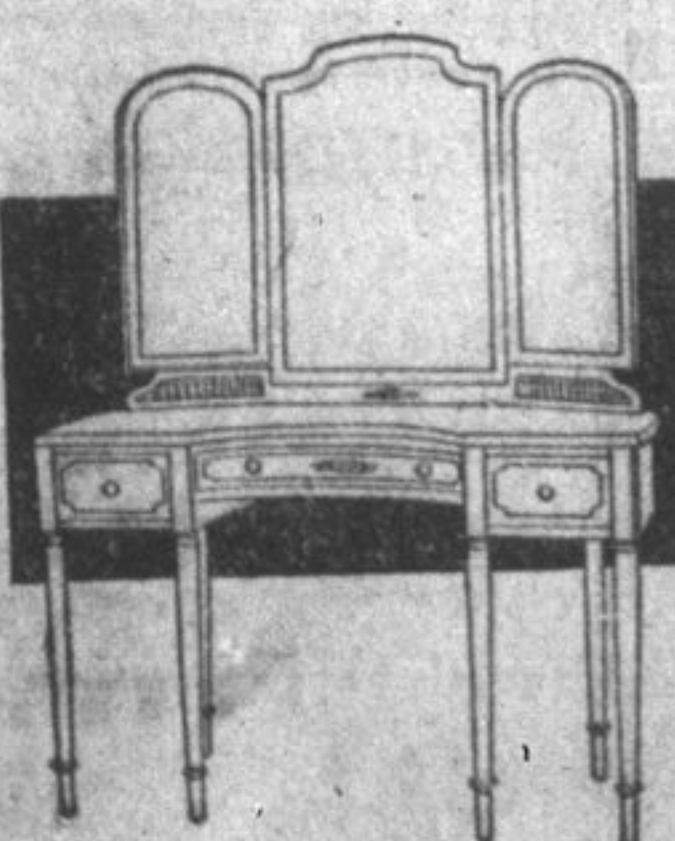

### SERVICE FLAG DEDICATED

IN ST. GEORGE'S CATHEDRAL ON SUNDAY MORNING.

The Flag was Presented on Behalf of the Parents of Cadets of Royal Military College Who Died Overseas.

A most impressive memorial service was held at St. George's Cathedral on Sunday morning, and a service flag of the Royal Military College was dedicated and presented to the rector of the cathedral by the commandant, Col. C. N. Perreau, on behalf of the parents of cadets who died in service during the war. The flag is 18 x 24 feet. In the centre is the Union Jack, and beneath it the motto of the college. Maple leaves to the number of 914 represent those graduates who served in the great war, and 140 crimson leaves represent those who paid the supreme sacrifice. The ceremony of dedication was performed by the Rt. Rev. Dr. Sweeney, Bishop of Toronto. A most impressive part of the service was the reading of the honor roll, at the conclusion of which the trumpets of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery sounded "The Last Post." This was followed by the hymn, "For All the Saints Who From Their Labor Rest."

### Sermon by Dr. Cody.

Hon. Dr. Cody, of Toronto, was the special speaker of the occasion. He took for his text, Hebrews xi. 13. "These 140 former cadets of the Royal Military College died in a good cause under the inspiration of faith in His works, and in their service they possessed a consciousness of ultimate victory." "To-day we come to give God thanks for His works and offer our sympathy to those who have lost their dear ones. It is a day of thanksgiving, a day of remembrance, a day of dedication. Systems and age-long ideas have passed away and dynasties have almost disappeared in a single night and the long discovered remnants of races are knit together." Generations seem to be concentrated into a single day, and what a day! declared the preacher. "A day of thanksgiving to God first and foremost for His handwriting deliverance for us. We must lift up our hearts in thanksgiving. A day of gratitude because the dead were the champions of the truth. We salute them and our Allies who have suffered—those whose lands were ravished, rooted and desolated. They know what exile and oppression are. We salute the gallant British troops and our own Canadian forces that rank among the best of men."

"When can their glory fade? It was a long way of agony from Mons to a way of tears and blood. Canada's name is indissolubly linked with it. We pay gratitude to-day to the Canadian."

Indian corps and we think of that splendid institution, the Royal Military College, and pay our tribute of respect and gratitude.

"Of his graduates and Cadets 914 have served in the great struggle, of whom 10 are dead, 337 were decorated, some with the Victoria Cross, and 422 mentioned. They served in every rank of the Imperial army, and in every unit of the Canadian force they were leaders. They kept at the call from every part of Canada and from every vocation. Truth, duty and valor were incarnated in them at the college and they have honored the college. A day of remembrance as well as a day of thanksgiving. What have they done and won for us? What epitaph could be more appropriate than "For your to-morrow they gave their to-day"—died in the noblest cause for which men can lay down their lives? Flags, brass, marble, public memorials in streets and squares did not form a fitting monument to the departed—they deserve a better monument than these. Only a Canada purer, nobler and bound in brotherly love could suffice."

"Crossing the Bar" was sung by Messrs Howard and Beda Fair.

The flag hangs on the wall of the north balcony, which is always occupied by the R.M.C. cadets. Dean Starr conducted the service as honorary chaplain of the Royal Military College, and read the honor roll.

Bishop Sweeney pronounced the benediction and the service concluded with the recessional hymn, "O Valiant Hearts." Among the distinguished military representatives in attendance were: General McBurn, Minister of Militia, accompanied by General Gwatkin, chief of the general staff; General Holmer, director general of manufactory, and Col. Osborne, military secretary. The seats in the centre of the cathedral were reserved for college staff and the parents of the deceased cadets, a number of whom were present. Brig-Gen. J. S. Mansell represented the G.O.C. of Military District No. 3, and member of his staff were present. The flowers that decorated the altar were sent to Dean Starr by Sir Henry Pellatt, of Toronto, for the occasion.

TURKS MASSACRED 10,000. Almost exterminated the Armenians in Some Towns. Amsterdam, Dec. 8.—Turkish forces massacred 10,000 Armenians while evacuating the towns of Baku, Old and Arduban in the Caucasus, according to reports received by the Vowwerts of Berlin. In fighting in Eszu more than 26,000 persons were killed. In some towns the entire Armenian population was exterminated. The Turks permitted Tartar troops to plunder the Armenians.

German and Turkish statistics in Constantinople in 1916 showed that 1,296,350 Armenians had been deported, and that of that number 1,056,550 had been massacred.
