VESSEL WAS DELAYED.

Towed Here From Toronto by Three Tugs on Monday Night.

A new vessel recently turned out by the Toronto Shipbuilding Company arrived in port on Monday night, af-ter being delayed for many hours on the trip down from Toronto. The vessel, which was towed by three tugs, is being taken on to Montreal. On Monday, it was feared that the vessel had met with a mishap, and the tug Frontenac, of the Donnelly Wrecking Company, was secured to make a trip out to search for the vessel, but it was found that steamer had put into Cobourg at two o'clock on Sunday morning. Owing to the lateness of the season, the steamer was not equipped with its machinery in Toronto. The machinery will be installed in the steamer at Montreal. The steamer was towed

The Florence is own-ed by the George Hall Company. Its hull will be 101 feet over all, with a twenty-three-foot beam, and will be onstructed of white pine.
