### THEATRICAL.

**At The Grand.**  
"His Robe of Honor" received its premiere showing at the Grand last evening and all present were highly enthusiastic about the way that the leading part was played by that clever and eminent actor, Henry Walthall. Mr. Walthall, who has starred in many other successes such as "The Birth of a Nation," "With Hoops of Steel," played his role of a young society man with all the grace and charm for which he is known, and some of his characterizations were excellent to say the least. Running through the story was a very pretty little romance that gave the picture a touch of realism which only can be realized when there is a boy and a girl concerned. Supporting this popular story was an excellent case, many of whom are known for their support of Mr. Walthall in other productions. For the completion of the bill there was the Pathe News, one of those Judge Brown stories that made such a hit in the summer and a very laughable comedy, while the dancing kings presented an act of new and novel dances that were a decided treat. This programme will be shown again to-night and also tomorrow, both matinee and night.

**At the Strand.**  
Ambassador James W. Gerard's famous book, "My Four Years in Germany," done into moving pictures, was shown to the public for the first time in Kingston when it was exhibited in the Strand Theatre last night. With conflicting emotions the audience sat through it, applauded, thunderously, hissed or were moved, as the scenes from before the assassination at Sarajevo up to America's entry into the war were called up before their eyes. The plottings of the great German military autocracy for world domination are revealed in a way that grips, also the violation of Belgium, and the events that led up to the declaration of war with Germany. Through the picture Ambassador Gerard himself moves, appearing in those incidents in which he played so prominent a part as the representative of the United States. The picture shows the contemptible attitude of German autocracy for America before the war and of the insults to which the ambassador was subjected. The Strand orchestra gave a fine rendering of Poet and Peasant Overture.

**At Griffin's.**  
Marguerite Clark, who, according to her admirers all over the country is the sweetest girl in motion pictures, a statement none appears willing to dispute, was seen in "Out of a Clear Sky," with great success yesterday at this theatre. The triumph of the star and the photoplay was instantaneous. It must be conceded by even the most biased patron of the movies that "Out of a Clear Sky" is a production far above the average. The great melodramatic spectacle, "Cheating the Public," was also shown for the first time yesterday, and aroused much interest. ### Military Matters

**The Late Mrs. McCullagh.**  
Mrs. Jane McCullagh, one of the older citizens of Kingston, passed away at the residence of her son, Samuel McCullagh, on Tuesday morning. The late Mrs. McCullagh was the widow of the late George McCullagh, who died seven years ago. She was born in New Town, Hamilton, Ballintemple, County Armagh, Ireland, on April 11th, 1825. She came to Canada in a sailing vessel with her father when only a child, and lived in Kingston most of her life. She is survived by her only surviving son, Samuel McCullagh, caretaker of the Armouries. The deceased was a member of St. Luke's Anglican Church.
