THE FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT WORKS FOR FIRST TIME IN TWO YEARS

ON THE WORK OF THE BRIGADE DURING THE YEAR.

The Fire Loss Has Been About \$50,000—The Motor Car Truck Has Done Excellent Work.

The civic fire and light committee concluded its business of the year, yesterday afternoon, when Fire Chief Armstrong gave a statement of the department's work. His report showed that to date the brigade had answered 114 calls, this being three more than for the year 1917. Five calls were for the pump, and two calls were outside the city limits, while thirteen calls were false alarms.

The loss on buildings and contents has been about \$50,000, with an insurance at risk on the property of about \$874,150.

There were forty-two calls, with a loss of about \$41,500, from January 1st to April 26th, and seventy-two calls with a loss of about \$8,500, from April 26th to Dec. 10th, April 26th being the date the motor car was placed in the station.

Owing to the quick arrival of the motor car, the work of the department has been considerably lightened. A number of cases before they have spread very far, with the result that the fire loss is considerably less than it would have been had the department been using horses on No. 2 horse wagon.

The chief thanked the committee for their kindness and support in his efforts to make the Kingston fire department one of the most efficient departments in the province, and in which he has been well supported by the members of the department.

A vote of appreciation of the services of the chairman, Ald. John Litton, was passed.

INFANT'S HOME ANNUAL

FORTY-FOUR CHILDREN AND SIX WOMEN CARED FOR.

Two Requests Received—A Deficit of \$108.57 Reported After a Very Struggled Year.

The annual meeting of the Home for Friendless Women and Children was held at the Home on Tuesday afternoon. The annual report was presented by the president, Mrs. W. H. Macnee, who said that it was only by careful management that the deficit in the year's funds was kept as low as it was. In the last twelve months forty-four children and six women have been cared for in the home. Two were transferred to the Orphans' Home, having reached the age limit of three years. Eight children were adopted into excellent homes. Eight infants, all under six

PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON

Received Resignation of Rev. J. D. Boyd—Other Business.

At the Kingston presbytery meeting held in Convocation Hall, reference was made to the lamented death of the late Prof. John Dall, and Prof. W. G. Jordan and Dr. Macgillivray were appointed to draft a minute expressive of the feelings of the presbytery and their sense of the loss sustained thereby.

Rev. J. D. Boyd tendered his resignation of the charge of Zion church. Regret was expressed by many members of the presbytery and the resignation was laid upon the table meanwhile.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Colin Fletcher, moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada, entered the court and was welcomed to a seat at the right hand of Moderator, the members of the Presbytery standing.

Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson submitted a report from the special committee on the Forward Movement, and stated that arrangements are being made for a special meeting to be held on Jan. 14th next in St. Andrew's church here, when representatives from the assembly's committee of fifty will be present and address the presbytery and others who may be invited to attend a full meeting of presbytery to deal with the very important matters to which several sessions of presbytery will then be given.

Queen's Theological Conference.

The third day's sittings of the Alumni Conference of Queen's University was held in Convocation Hall on Wednesday. The proceedings started at ten o'clock, with the second of the series of chancellor's lectureship addresses by Rev. Prof. William Morgan, D.D. The subject of this lecture was "What is Christianity." At eleven o'clock Rev. D. A. Ramsay, M.A., Belleville, addressed the conference on the subject of "Divine Immanence." In the afternoon the sessions were continued at three o'clock, when the speaker was Rev. R. H. Somerville, Thornton. He gave an address on "The Church in the New Testament."

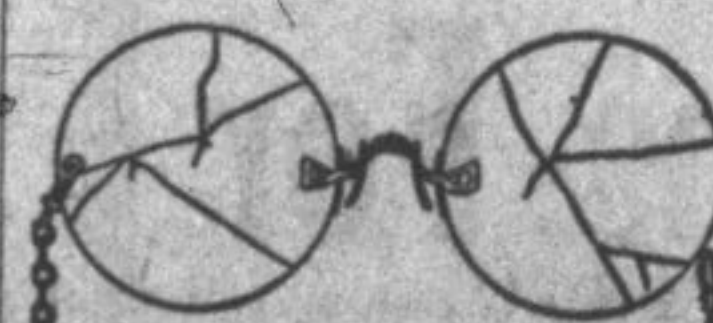
