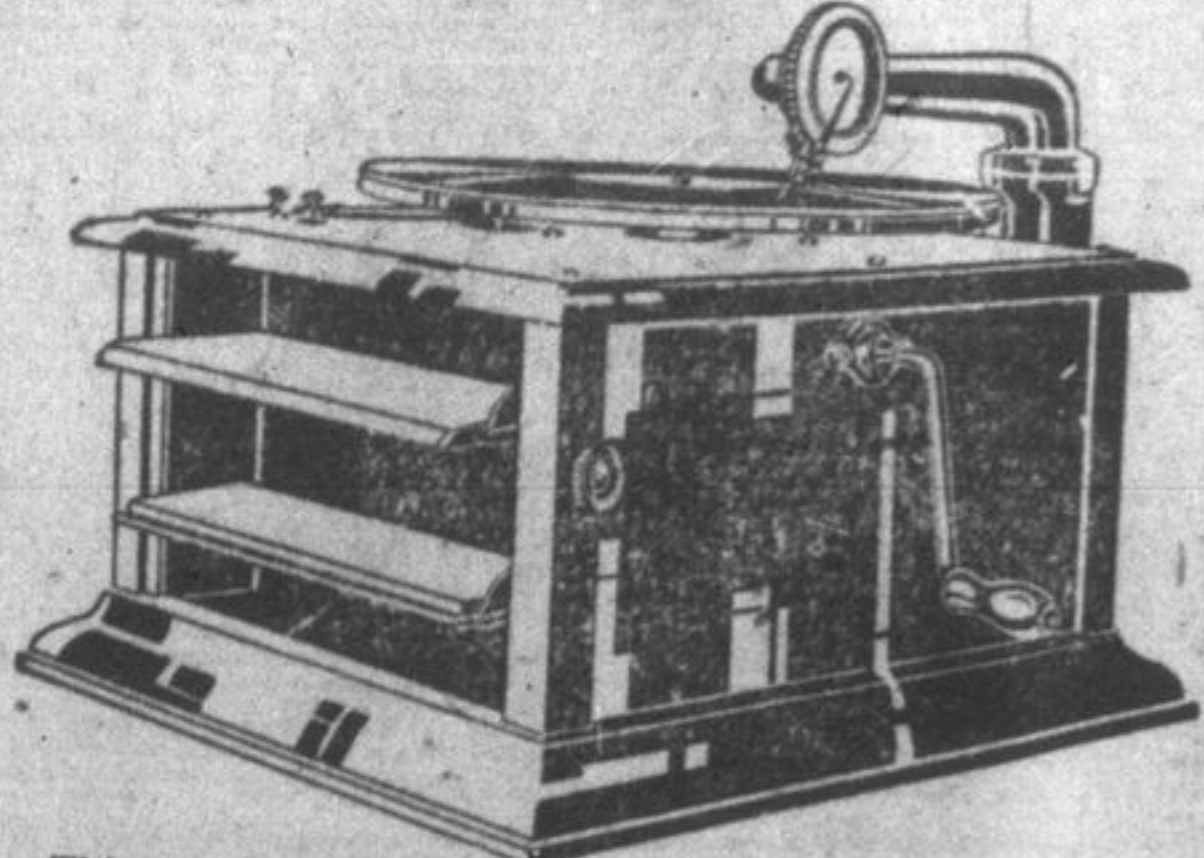
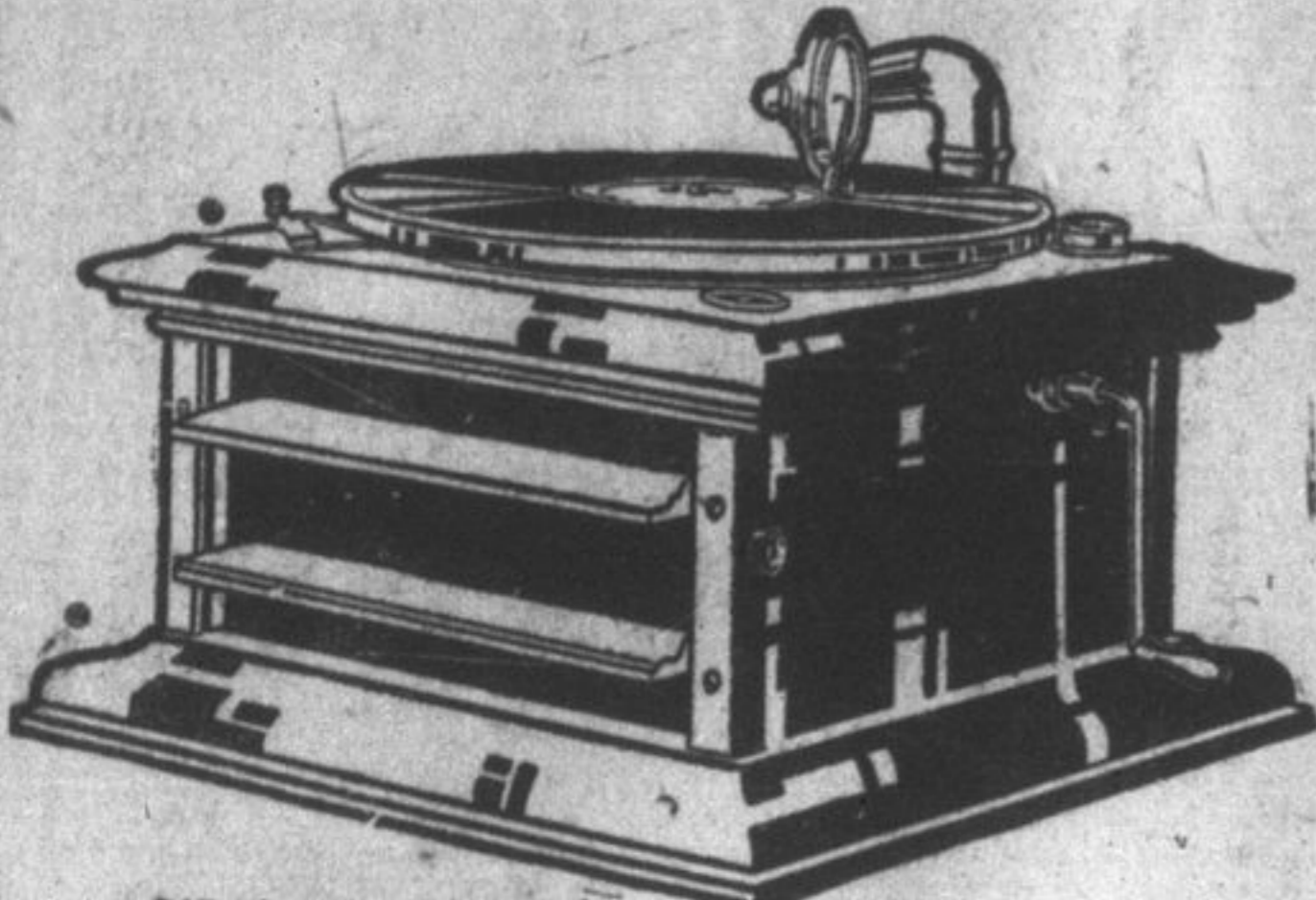

Sporting Notes

Stan Muston, the good right wing of the St. Patrick's hockey team, is expected to shine this season.

Gordon Meeking was anxious to secure the services of Dennis Breen for his proposed Barrie O.H.O. sextette. However, the Halleybury player elected to remain here and play with St. Patrick's.

Ernie Johnson, former Wanderer defence star, who was at Portland, will likely play for Vancouver in the Pacific Coast Hockey League. With St. Griffin and Frank Patrick out of the game, the Millionaires will have a couple of vacancies.

Toronto baseball fans are looking forward with great interest to the coming meeting of the American League. They expect next week to see Toronto elevated to the highest classification in baseball.

Lieut. William O'Hara, whom "Mugsy" McGraw, of the New York Giants, once said was the best outfielder in baseball, that is from the point of playing that position, and not as a hitter, is back with us again after lecturing in the United States for a year under the auspices of the United States Aerial Administration.

TWO MORE ARE COMING.

Ottawa Expects Broadbent and Graham Home Soon. Word was received in Ottawa that two prominent local hockey stars who had been serving in France had returned to England, and could be expected home by the end of the year. These are "Punch" Broadbent, M.C., a former wing man of the Ottawa Hockey Club, and "Leth" Graham, also a star wing of the Senators. Both have been overseas for about three years. Broadbent was slated for a commission when the armistice came through. Announcement is also made that Bill Mooney, of the Royal Canadian, will receive another trial with the Ottawa club.

Snags Baseball Commission. Benjamin P. Moulton, president of the Rhode Island Exhibition Company, operating the Providence Baseball Club, has brought suit against Ban Johnson and Garry Herrmann, as members of the National Commission, for the payment of \$2,500 awarded to the Providence club by the commission as payment for Walter Mayer, son of the Boston American League club at the close of the 1917 season.

Hyland Says He's Through. Harry Hyland, formerly of the Montreal Wanderers, and last season with Ottawa, announces that he had retired from hockey. Hyland now holds a position at the Canadian Allis-Chalmers plant, Montreal, and cannot devote any time to playing hockey. During his career with the Wanderers, he played every position with the exception of goal, and was one of the most useful men on the club.

TO STOP BETTING EVIL.

American League is Determined to Stamp Out Menace. The American League, as a whole, is planning, through Ban Johnson, to make a vigorous crusade against public betting in ball parks. Johnson and his supporters are determined to stamp out this growing evil. They intend to enforce the provisions of the league's constitution and the rules of the national agreement no matter who may be heard. A club owner who willfully permits open gambling on his grounds can be expelled by a three-fourths vote, and Johnson is prepared to go the limit.

Columbia Plans Hockey. Columbia will revive hockey after the university re-opens in January if it is found practicable to flood South Field. Levering Tyson, graduate manager of athletics, and Henry Les Norris, superintendent of buildings, had a conference yesterday at which it was decided that an attempt would be made to flood a part of the field for use as a hockey rink. Columbia has not had a hockey team for several years because of the difficulty in obtaining a playing surface either outdoors or indoors. It is believed that it will be possible to flood the field because since the Army Training Corps used it, it has been packed down and is now two inches or more lower than it formerly was.

Crooked Horsemen. Three harness horsemen, Messrs. Richard and Belchard Squires, of Hartford, Conn., and F. E. Halliday, of San Jose, Cal., have been expelled from the National Trotting Association for alleged "fining." The first named pair did a tidy bit of camouflaging at Windsor last season, when they dyed the mare Edna E., a jet black and raced her in a slow class, though she had a mark of 2.09. Halliday's offence was not so bare-faced. He raced the pacing mare, Emmaline H., under the name of Nettie H. He only changed the name, not the color of her hide.

More Ladies' Hockey. It is likely that there will be a meeting shortly for the organization of a ladies' hockey league, consisting of the Renfrew and Ottawa teams and one or two others, representing adjacent towns in the Ottawa Valley. There has already been correspondence on the subject and it is likely that the league will be formed as planned.
