QUEEN'S TO TAKE PART

IN GIVING AEROPLANE INSTRUCTION TO STUDENTS.

Royal Air Force Handing Over Materials to the University—Instruction Will Be in Department of Practical Science.

Now that the war is over, the aeroplane will become a means of commercial transport, and will be developed along peace-time lines. Queen's University is determined to be in the lead in this development, and already steps are being taken to have aeroplane instruction included in the faculty of science.

One Avro aeroplane, fitted with an 130 H. P. rotary Clerget engine; one Curtiss aeroplane, fitted with instruments and wireless apparatus; one Gnome rotary engine, one 90 H. P. Curtiss engine, one 110 H. P. J. P. Rhone engine, one spare 130 H. P. Clerget engine, an assortment of wireless instructional apparatus, an assortment of photography instructional apparatus, and of aerial gunnery instructional apparatus, including two machine guns.

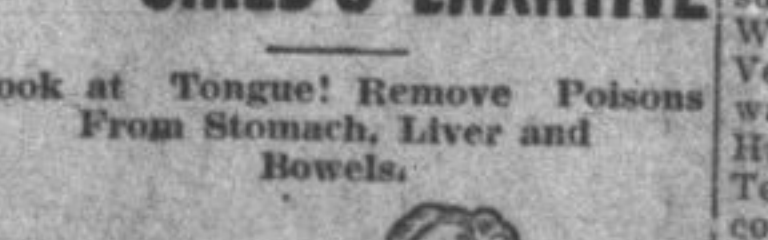

Henderson, of the faculty of applied science, are greatly concerned with the mechanical and wireless apparatus.
