Heard Action at Napanee.
An action brought by a farmer named Revell, of Odessa, for damages against Babcock & Sons, also of Odessa, was tried before Judge Lavell at Napanee on Thursday. The action was for about \$50 damages for the defendants having retained the slabs after sawing up logs for the plaintiff in their sawmill. The defence was that according to general custom, all slabs belonged to the mill unless some bargain was made to the contrary. The action was dismissed with costs.

Military Matters

All ranks who are in receipt of rations or allowance in lieu thereof, are to have an extra allowance of twenty-five cents per man for the 25th of December for Christmas dinner.

Bombardier J. V. Grace and Gunner T. G. Morgan have been discharged from C Battery, R.C.H.A., to civil life.

Sergt-Major D. M. Pennie has returned from on command to duty with the R. S. A.

B. Q. M. S. Jones, No. 3 C. G. R., attached No. 3 C. A. S. C. Service Company, has been admitted to hospital, sick. He is still suffering from the effects of exposure and weather conditions at the front.

Gunner A. E. Stephens, No. 3 Depot Field Battery, has been admitted to Queen's Military Hospital.

The number of men discharged from the Depot Field Battery on Saturday was ten. There are now very few men left in that unit, which has been the first to demobilize in the Kingston garrison.

257 BATTALIONS RAISED
And Sent Overseas by Canada—44 Now Serving.
The Department of Militia and Defence authorized the publication of a record of all the infantry battalions raised in Canada for the Canadian Expeditionary Force, which subsequently crossed the sea. With the exception of the first seventeen, which were attested at Valcartier, it shows where each corps was recruited; it also shows what became of each of them. Of the 257 battalions raised, 44 now are serving in the Canadian corps, forming eleven of its twelve brigades; the remaining brigades are formed of Canadian Mounted Rifles organized as infantry. The others were absorbed or disbanded; that is, they were used to reinforce some one or other of the corps in the field. A few had somewhat different fates: One, the 86th, became a machine gun battalion; the 228th, 239th, 256th and 257th were transferred into Canadian railway troops, the 6th, 3rd, 10th and 7th Battalions respectively; and the 230th became part of the Canadian Forestry Corps.

The Officers Chosen.
The election of officers of the Queen's University Theological Association Alumni was held at the final session of Friday. Capt. the Rev. A. G. MacKinnon, of Lachine, was re-elected president; Rev. W. M. Kannan, B.A., B.D., Toronto, was elected vice-president; and Rev. W. Taylor Dale, of Cooke's church, Kingston, was elected secretary-treasurer.

Met the Architects.
The building committee of the General Hospital met Messrs. Stephen and Lee, expert hospital architects, Boston, and talked over plans for the proposed additions, and more especially regarding location, but no definite action was taken. Details will be gone into later on.
