CONDITION OF AFFAIRS	
Belgium Farmers Now Stripped of Livelihood	

Hundreds of thousands of trees have been cut down. Eight out of every ten houses have been blown up or otherwise destroyed. Every living animal long ago disappeared and all farm implements were seized and carried away by the Germans, so that the farmers or those who remain have not the tools to commence the cultivation of their land, no matter how willing they are to begin. The stocks of seeds and roots were re-

quisitioned, and in some homes in the country places families have been left to sleep and eat on the floor, all furniture having been taken.

"In the villages all ordinary life has been arrested. Women and children stand patiently by the roadside waiting the approach of the allied soldiers. Some, who were fortunate in hiding bottles of wine, have now brought this out, together with every variety of receptacle they can find for the reception of their deliverers."

So writes one who has visited the villages of Belgium only lately tenanted by the Germans. In the cities there is the same condition of affairs. Factories, workshops and all industries have been so completely tampered with, where they have not actually been destroyed, that the industrial life of Belgium is necessarily at a standstill. The farmers need farm tools and the factories machinery and raw materials before the ordinary life of the nation can again be resumed, and the people once more replaced on their old self sustaining basis.

Today, with everything so disorganized in Belgium, with no work for the people to do, and no supplies on hand with which to feed and clothe them, the cry goes out to outside countries to come to their help and send over supplies until such time as they can again settle down to normal productive times. The winter months will be a time of organization for Belgium, but during the most trying months of the year they must be fed and clothed. Those who will help send supplies over to these people so that their sufferings may not be enhanced send their contributions to their local committee or direct to the Central Committee, Belgian Relief Fund, 59 St. Peter street, Montreal.
