CONDITION OF AFFAIRS

Belgian Farmers Now Stripped of Livelihood

Hundred of thousands of trees are being cut down. Eight out of every ten houses have been blown up or otherwise destroyed. Every living thing long ago disappeared and all farm implements were seized and carried away by the Germans, so that the farmers or those who remain have not the tools to commence the cultivation of their land, no matter how willing they are to begin. The stocks of seeds and roots were re-

quisitioned, and in some homes in the country places families have been left to sleep and eat on the floor, all furniture having been taken.

"In the villages all ordinary life has been arrested. Women and children stand patiently by the roadside waiting the approach of the allied soldiers. Some, who were fortunate in hiding bottles of wine, have now brought this out, together with every variety of receptacle they can find for the reception of their deliveries."

So writes one who has visited the villages of Belgium only lately tenanted by the Germans. In the cities there is the same condition of affairs. Factories, workshops and all industries have been so completely tampered with, where they have not actually been destroyed, that the industrial life of Belgium is necessarily at a standstill. The farmers need farm tools and the factories machinery and raw materials before the ordinary life of the nation can again be resumed, and the people once more replaced on their old self sustaining basis.

Today with everything so disorganized in Belgium, with no work for the people to do, and no supplies on hand with which to feed and clothe them, the cry goes out to outside countries to come to their help and send over supplies until such time as they can again settle down to normal productive times. The winter months will be a time of organization for Belgium, but during the most trying months of the year they must be fed and clothed. FIGURES DEMONSTRATE SECURITY OF MARKET

Bulk of Canadian Preferred and Common Yield a High Rate.

Toronto, Dec. 13.—Out of 26 listed preferred issues on Canadian Stock Exchanges no less than 23 of them are paying dividends. The highest payer is Nova Scotia Steel and Coal preferred at 8 per cent., while Mackay preferred is the lowest at 4 per cent. Nevertheless on the basis of present prices, the yields on these preferred stocks run from 6.1 per cent. to 10.1 per cent. Twenty-one of the 23 stocks yield 7 per cent. or more. For a preferred class of stocks that is a remarkable record. It emphasizes the secure condition of the market. As to earnings all but five companies represented in these issues earned over 10 per cent. on the preferred stock and 10 of them earned over 20 per cent. The present market condition of Canadian preferred stocks would not exist under normal conditions. This is why the street looks forward with confidence to a strong market in the early spring, at least.

With regard to common shares of Canadian companies the same may be said. Out of 34 issues listed no less than 30 are paying dividends, and it is almost certain that several others will join the dividend list before long. Six out of 14 utilities are paying above 6 per cent. and are yielding above 6 per cent. at prevailing market prices. Twenty-one industrial are paying dividends out of 30 listed common issues, and 17 of them 6 per cent. or more. With regard to yields at present market prices, 19 out of 29 common industrial dividend payers yield over 6 per cent., 16 yield 7 per cent. or over, and 11 yield 8 per cent. or over, while 3 yield 9 per cent. or over, and 1 yield 10 per cent. or over. The common shares yielding over 8 per cent. are Stimpson, Cement, Canadian Cottons, Canadian Locomotive, Consolidated Mining and Smelting, Dominion Steel, Dominion Textile, Laurentide, Lake of the Woods, Lyall, Maple Leaf, Montreal Cottons, Nova Scotia Steel and Coal, Ontario Peninsular, Pulp, Paper, Riddell, Sherwin Williams, Spanish River Steel of Canada, Vancouver, and Woods Manufacturing.

During the last year reported, the following public utilities earned over 6 per cent. on the common stock: Bell Telephone, Canadian Pacific Railway, Canada Steamship Lines, Detroit United, Ottawa, Light, Heat and Power, Shawinigan Water and Power, Toronto Railway and Twin City.

The following industrial companies earned 6 per cent. or over on the common stock: Brompton, Canadian Car and Foundry, Cement, Canadian Cottons, General Electric, Canadian Locomotive, Consolidated Mining and Smelting, Dominion Bridge, Dominion Cannery, Dominion Steel, Dominion Textile, Laurentide, Lake of the Woods, Lyall, Maple Leaf, Montreal Cottons, Nova Scotia Steel and Coal, Ontario Peninsular, Pulp, Paper, Riddell, Sherwin Williams, Spanish River Steel of Canada, Vancouver, and Woods Manufacturing.
