Military Matters

Lieut. A. G. Hutcheon, R.A., a graduate of the Royal Military College, a prisoner in Germany for some time, has been repatriated.

Pte. Potter is a brother of Mrs. William Jackson, Aberdeen street. He reverted from a captain to get overseas.

Brig-Gen. J. S. Mansell, G.S.O., proceeded to Ottawa on Saturday and Lieut.-Col. Harry Genet, A.A.G., is in charge of the administration during his absence.

Capt. J. H. Roberts, M.C., Kingston, is among the returned officers on the SS. Olympic, which reached Halifax on Saturday.

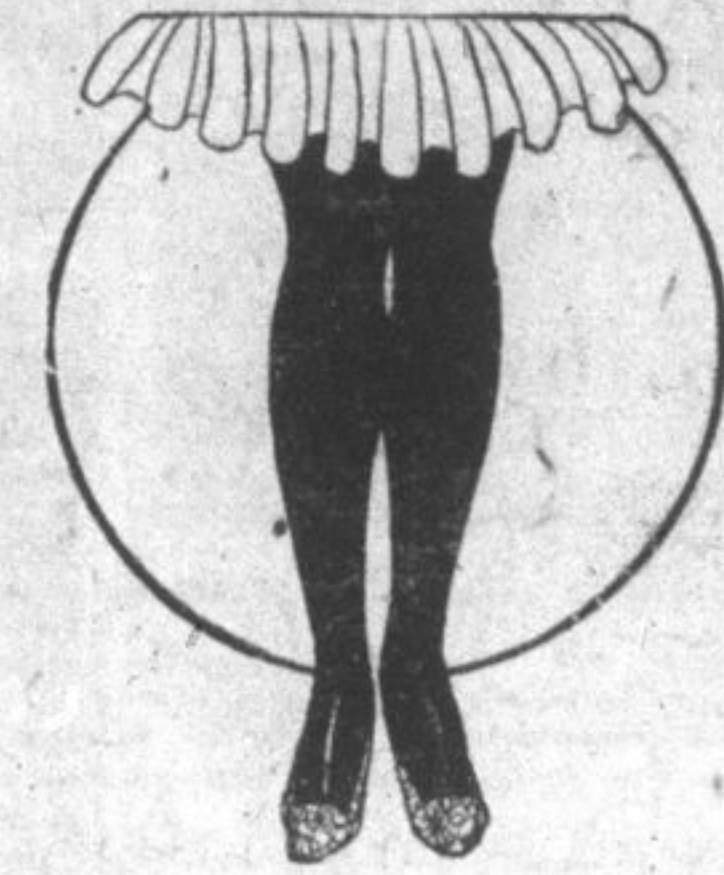

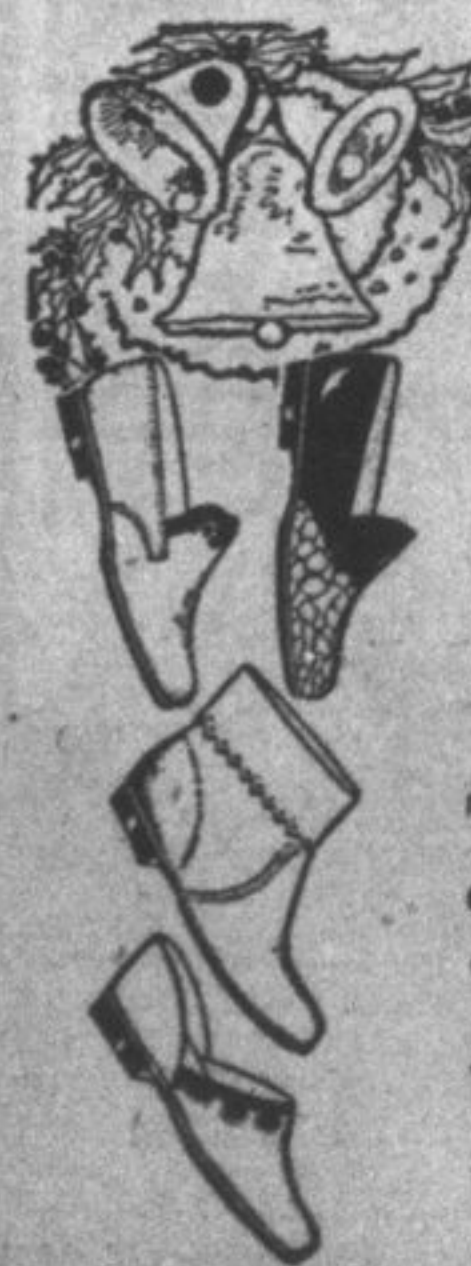
