TO BOOST THE MEMBERSHIP INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

OF THE G. W. V. A. AT FIRST OF YEAR.

Treatment Accorded A Soldiers' Widow Under Discussion—A Presentation Made To Comrade W. Smith.

The Great War Veterans' Association met on Monday evening, Comrade C. W. Topping in the chair in the absence of Col. R. Crocker, on military duty.

Letters were read from the Association to the mayor and City Council on the subject of the arrival of troop trains; to the president, medical board department of the soldiers' civil re-establishment on the subject of the granting of leave to patients in sanatoria, and to the chairman, department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, regarding railway travelling concessions for patients under their dept. The news that the request regarding this concession had been granted was received with enthusiasm. Considerable interest on the subject of the disturbance of the Victory Ball by Queen's students was also read.

An interesting event took place when the new chairman of the dance committee, Comrade T. Murray, presented to the meeting chairman with a G.W.V.A. ring as a small token of the gratitude of the association for his past work, and of the esteem in which he is held by his comrades. Comrade W. Smith replied suitably, thanking the association for the present, and giving the comrades some very good advice. The regret of the association was expressed at the loss of so energetic a worker.

The dance committee reported that a most successful dance was held last Friday. The visiting committee made a report of visits to the Mowat hospital, which a general feeling of satisfaction exists amongst the patients at the knowledge that the association is looking after their interests on several matters. It has been requested that notification be sent to this committee when any member is sick in his home or in hospital, so that any action necessary may be taken.

A complaint has been received by the investigation of complaints committee. This complaint, which is being investigated, is of great interest to all who have at heart the welfare of the returned soldier and his dependents, and more especially the widows of men who have been killed in action. In this case, there is a widow and three children to be cared for. It appears that she has been endeavoring to keep body and soul together, and to bring up her children in the way that her husband would wish, by working in a local factory in order to add to the small pension granted to her by the government. This pension was totally inadequate for her needs. She has been summarily dismissed from her employment for an illness, and this matter is being investigated by the association. Very strong views were expressed in the meeting regarding this case.

A boost of the membership of the association is being planned for the beginning of the New Year, and plans are being made to have the campaign carried out. The reception committee asked that more interest be taken in the meeting of returning soldiers by the comrades of the association. Reports were also received from the leading and the peoples' forum committees.

A letter from the British Whig was read asking that the band take part in the programme at the Victoria Christmas Tree for veterans' children to be held in the Armouries on Friday, December 27th. The bandmaster expressed his willingness to do so and said it was a pleasure to co-operate in this event. The feeling of the meeting was that the proposed entertainment is one that merits the hearty support of the association.

A discussion took place on the advisability of holding another exhibition or entertainment similar to the "Over the Top" celebration on the 1st of July, 1919. Notice of motion that this be discussed was given. The question of the return of munition workers' wives and families from overseas at the public expense, whilst the families of soldiers were only returned at the expense of the soldier was brought up and discussed, and this matter is to be fully investigated by the investigation of complaints committee.

Kingston Skating Club.
The Kingston Skating Club held its annual meeting on Monday evening. It was decided to carry on as in past years on Saturday evenings at the skating rink. The following officers were elected: Honorary president, J. B. Carruthers; manager, E. O. Gidderleeve; vice-presidents, Mrs. W. F. Nickle, Mrs. G. McKay, Mrs. (Major) H. O. Lawson and Miss W. Gordon; secretary, Miss Mildred Jones; treasurer, P. D. Lyman; committee of management, Major H. O. Lawson, Prof. M. B. Baker, Major T. A. Kidd, Douglas Chown, Miss Eva Richardson, Miss Helen McKay, Miss Mamie Anglin and Mrs. Frank Ryan. It was decided to reduce the membership fee to cadets and to Queen's students. The age limit for lady members has been reduced from eighteen to sixteen.

Not Penitentiary's Fault.
It is not the fault of the penitentiary warden that convicts are not taken into the prison on Sunday. In the case of the woman transferred here from Dorchester, the warden would have taken her in if the sheriff who brought her to the city had telephoned him. It is the rule at the penitentiary not to accept prisoners on Sunday and hence there is no reason for sheriffs bringing them on that day, but in special cases the warden of the penitentiary at Portsmouth has accepted prisoners on Sunday when notified in advance.

CANNOT GRANT LEAVE.

Patients at Mowat Sanatorium Must Remain on Christmas.

The Great War Veterans of Kingston recently communicated with the Director of Military Services, Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, Ottawa, on the subject of the granting of Christmas leave to tuberculosis patients under their care, and have received a reply to the effect that while every one must appreciate the desire of the boys to get home during the Christmas holidays, it must be remembered that the first duty of the hospital staff is to get them well, in order that they may be able to enjoy many more Christmases. In the meantime, the large majority of superintendents of sanatoria are agreed that leave of absence for tuberculosis patients during festive seasons is a serious mistake, and patients almost invariably are upset, and suffer correspondingly. Relapses occur, as the result of the patients overdoing themselves, either wilfully or through the thoughtless kindness of his friends, and he returns to the sanatorium with months of treatment undone, and in many instances so far relapsed as to be incurable. It is understood that the superintendent of the Mowat Sanatorium endorses these opinions. This statement is made public in the hope that the boys and their friends will realize that while the authorities are willing to assist them in every way, it would be a great unkindness to grant them leave at this season.
