CHURCH CHOIR CONCERT

GIVEN IN QUEEN STREET METHODIST CHURCH TUESDAY EVENING.

A Large Audience Enjoyed A Very Fine Programme—Rehab Tandy and Judge Lavell Were Soloists.

A Christmas concert of high merit was given to a fine audience in Queen street Methodist church on Tuesday evening by the choir of the church and members of the congregation. The event was one of the best provided by the excellent musical organization. R. M. Chase, the organist and leader showed marked ability in his work and its organ, not of the most modern type, gave forth strains that few in the congregation ever thought it was capable of. The choir has undertaken improvements, including an electric motor, and it was to help raise funds that last night's cantata "The People That Walked in Darkness" was given.

The first item on the programme was Dykes' Christmas Carol, "Once Again, O Blessed Time," rendered by the choir, with the solo parts taken by Mrs. J. Evans and A. Pettigrew, who sang in their usual effective manner. Mrs. H. T. J. Coleman was heard to good advantage in the Recitative and Aria, "O Thou That Tellest" from Handel's "Messiah." She gave a splendid rendering of this most difficult selection. Rehab Tandy sings well, and rendered the Oratorio (a) recit. "Darkness Driven Away," air (b) "The People That Walked in Darkness," and "For Unto Us a Child is Born" composed by himself.

Mrs. J. Evans sang Handel's Aria, "Rejoice Greatly," from the "Messiah," in fine voice. This was followed by a bass solo by Joseph Hodge, who chose as his selection in the recitative and aria "The People That Walked in Darkness" from Handel's "Messiah." He showed splendid control of an exceptionally strong bass voice, and was well received. Messrs. Hodge, Pettigrew, Marshall and Hodge in a male quartette "Holy Night" by Gruber, did excellent work. This was followed by an organ recitative and allegro splendidly given by R. M. Chase.

Rev. J. D. Ellis gave a short address, in which he spoke on the significance of Christmas and the Christmas spirit. He was followed by an anthem "Hail, Thou That Art Highly Favoured," by the choir, in which Allan Hafner sang the tenor solo. A violin selection, "Andante from Concerto" by Mendelssohn, was beautifully handled by Miss Goldie Bartels who showed admirable control of her instrument. A tenor solo by Allan Hafner, "Noel" (Adam), was sung in Mr. Hafner's usual finished manner. A mixed quartette, Mrs. J. Evans, Mrs. W. MacCallum, Archie Pettigrew and W. MacCallum, sang "Sleep, Holy Babe" (Dykes). Mrs. MacCallum has a very fine contralto voice, and was heard to good advantage in this selection. J. G. Elliott moved a hearty vote of thanks to the choir for their splendid entertainment. The last item was by far the best of all. It was the anthem "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear" (Stainer), and the solo part was sung by Judge H. A. Lavell. He is possessed of a grand baritone voice. The whole programme reflected great credit upon the choir and those who assisted in carrying it out.

CORPL. JOHN KENNEDY.

Well-known Kingston Young Man Dies in England.
Corpl. John Kennedy, Canadian motor Transport Company, it is officially reported, died of pneumonia Dec. 13th, in Bermuda Military Hospital, Ladywell Road, S.E., England. He was born in Kingston, twenty-seven years ago, being the only son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Kennedy. Since a young boy he made his home with Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Litton, Frontenac street. He leaves five sisters, Misses Bella McCall, Agnes Litton, and Bertha Basam, all of Kingston; Mrs. Charles Nicholson, Sunbury, and Mrs. F. Norris, Saltcoats, Sask.

Corpl. Kennedy enlisted in October, 1914, with Queen's Engineers and was later transferred to the 2nd Canadian Transport Company, in training in Toronto. With this company he went overseas in April, 1915, and was with it in France up to time of his illness.

The deceased was a popular young Kingston man, and before the war was a prominent baseball player with the Ponies. He went through the war without receiving a scratch.
