WELL EQUIPPED BUILDING INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

IS THE RICHARDSON PUBLIC BATHING HOUSE.

Everything is of the Most Permanent Character and Up-to-date in Every Respect—A Description of the New Building.

Any person passing Macdonald Park, on King street, must have noticed that handsome and substantial new building upon the lake shore.

Not a few tourists passing through the park made enquiries as to what it was to be used for, and were told to give it a closer inspection, and upon looking at the inscription over the entrance found that it was a bequest from the late Capt. George Richardson for the benefit of the children and citizens of Kingston as a free bath-house, and judging from all appearance it will be a memorial to the donor for ages to come, as everything about it is of the most permanent character.

The walls are built of local limestone, in rock-faced ashlar style, the roof is covered with red Spanish tile, contrasting with the surrounding green, gives the building a handsome appearance. The approach to each of the entrances is gained by four broad steps and a platform, set with red tile, the entrance doors are solid oak, set with heavy beveled plate-glass, while the door handles and hinges are massive and antique in style. On entering the hall we find that it runs right through the building from side to side. The floor is paved with red diamond-shaped tile, while the dado is of polished grey marble in panels, while the walls are finished by a cornice in neat design. Turning to the right, we enter the west or male wing of the building, which we find well lighted with windows so constructed that when open they avoid any draught upon those within. The floor of this and the eastern wing is composed of artificial marble. At the far end of the room we find six neat stalls, or dressing rooms, filled with a seat and clothes hooks, while down either side are rows of metal lockers for containing the bathing suits of those who wish to take advantage of the convenience. Down the centre is a row of antique shaped benches, to serve as seats of rest. Just inside the entrance door to this room we find a well fitted lavatory and two shower baths built of white Italian marble. There is a convenient chute, where the wet bathing suits may be passed down below to be dried or washed. Coming out of the hall again we face the office, which is equipped with a range of pigeon holes. On the opposite side of the hall is a handsome oak stairs, leading to the observation tower, where a magnificent view can be had of the surrounding harbor. The floor of this room is also set in diamond-shaped tiles, and the windows which surround the room are fitted with metal sash.

Returning downstairs, and going down to the basement, in the centre of the building, we find a hot water heating plant of liberal size with a supplementary for heating the shower baths; also a set of laundry tubs.

The eastern or female wing is a duplicate of the one already described. The building throughout is fitted with electric light.

Taking it all in all, the building will be a memorial for years to come not only to donor but to the builders, McKelvey & Birch.
