## THE SOLDIERS' CHRISTMAS INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

### CELEBRATIONS AT THE VARIOUS MILITARY HOSPITALS.

One Headquarters Staff Visited the Soldiers at Their Quarters — A Very Happy Time Was Spent.

Christmas festivities commenced at an early hour at Queen's Military Hospital. At nine o'clock the band of the Great War Veterans' Association arrived on the scene and serenaded the patients. At noon the Christmas dinner was served, and it was a grand repast. The rations had been augmented by gifts sent through the medium of the Standard Christmas Dinner Fund, and a splendid dinner was the result. During the dinner the hospital was visited by Brig.-Gen. G. S. Maunsell and the headquarters staff of the military district, accompanied by the band of the R. C. H. A.

In the afternoon a Christmas tree and concert were held through the generosity of the Daughters of the Empire. The tree was beautifully decorated, and laden with gifts. Every patient and member of the staff received a gift from the tree. W. F. Nickle presented every 21st Battalion man in the hospital with a box of cigars a gift from his son, Capt. W. Nickle, a former 21st officer, still in England. A fine musical programme was rendered, and refreshments were served. Christmas day at Queen's was one of festivity from morning until night.

At Sydenham Military Hospital. The Christmas tree and entertainment at Sydenham military hospital was held on Monday evening. The Daughters of the Empire arranged a splendid treat, and presented gifts for every patient. The Christmas tree was held in one of the downstairs wards, which was decorated for the occasion, and Santa Claus visited the boys and left them all their Christmas presents. A musical programme was given and refreshments were supplied by the ladies. On Christmas day there was a special dinner, and the hospital was at 12.45 o'clock visited by Brig.-Gen. Maunsell, Brig.-Gen. Hemming, and the headquarters staff, who extended the greetings of the season to the patients.

At the Mowat Sanatorium. The patients of Mowat sanatorium had a lively and enjoyable Christmas day. The band of the G. W. V. A. arrived at nine o'clock and played a splendid program of music. After they had left, Salsbury's orchestra arrived, and played all forenoon. Dinner was served at noon, and it was a real Christmas repast. Col. Genet and Major McManus, on behalf of the headquarters staff of M. D. 3, in Germany, has been awarded the meritorious service medal. The medal has been sent to Mrs. King by registered post and it was accompanied by the following letter from Col. Harry Genet, A.A.G., M.D. No. 3. At the Barracks. The troops in the various barracks of the garrison all enjoyed a big Christmas dinner on Wednesday. Thanks to the generosity of the citizens who subscribed to the Christmas dinner fund, extra rations and special Christmas dainties were sent out to all units, and prepared by the regimental cooks. During the dinner the barracks at Barriefield, Fort Henry, Tete de Pont barracks, and the artillery park barracks were visited by the headquarters staff of the military district, who presented the compliments of the season to the boys. A large number of the soldiers were granted Christmas leave, but every effort was made to make Christmas as pleasant as possible for those who were not allowed to go. The boys were allowed a complete holiday, and thoroughly enjoyed the festivities.

Christmas Greetings Received. The Whig's Christmas mail contained cards of greeting from prominent citizens and from various clubs and firms. One of the finest cards received was one extending the greetings of the season to the Whig from Lieut.-Col. R. J. Gardiner and his staff. It was adorned with the C. A. M. C. crest, and the greeting was very tastefully arranged. The Kingston Curling Club sent a card symbolical of the sport of curling. On the front is the figure of a curler engaged in sending one of the curling stones along the ice. The staff of the Hotel Dieu sent a plain but tasteful greeting card. Cards from outside points were received from the E. B. Eddy Company, E. J. Slack, managing director of the Montreal Gazette, a handsome souvenir, and the Chevrolet and McLaughlin Motor Car Companies. A hearty Christmas greeting was also received from E. J. Powers, the Whig's special advertising agent in Chicago.

Christmas in the Churches. Christmas day was faithfully observed by the Anglican churches in the city. All of them were beautifully decorated with fir and flowers, and special Christmas music was rendered. Holy Communion was celebrated at 8 a.m., and the attendance at that hour at St. George's, St. Luke's, St. James' and St. Paul's was very large. At the 11 o'clock services the music was a special feature. The special offerings were reported by several churches to be the largest on record.

A special service was held at Sydenham, Street Methodist Church at 11 a.m. At St. Mary's Cathedral mass was celebrated at 5.30, 7.30, 9, and 10.30 a.m., and Holy Communion was partaken by a very large number. All of the masses were well attended.
