G.W.V.A. ROLL OF HONOR

IS TO BE PREPARED FOR LOCAL HEADQUARTERS

Photo of Each Member to be Included.—Report On Year Book.—The Veterans Arranging For a Concert.

At Monday evening's meeting the Great War Veterans' Association the vice chairman of the membership committee explained a suggestion that he was putting forward for the preparation of a "Roll of Honor" of members of the association. He expressed the opinion that a great many institutions had a "Roll of Honor" of men who had fallen, and that it would be a far better idea to have a roll of honor of those who had served their country and been lucky enough to return home, many of them sadly disabled. This roll would, he suggested, take the form of a large and handsomely decorated poster, with a beautifully designed heading, and on the front in the body a number of maple leaves in their natural colors, containing in their centre a photo of a member with a short note of his service, etc. under each photo. This suggestion received a hearty approval from the members present and it was decided to go ahead with the proposal. Members willing to have their photo appear are requested to give their names and particulars to the Secretary, Treasurer as soon as possible.

It was reported that thirty-three new members had been initiated during the month of December. This was considered fairly satisfactory but the opinion was expressed that it ought to be a hundred and thirty-three, with so many returning at the present time.

The Year Book committee reported that this book would, it was thought, be ready for the printer early in January, but it would not be skimped in order to get it in press a day earlier, if necessary it would be brought up to a higher standard.

It was resolved to adopt the constitution and by-laws of the Association, as issued by the Dominion Convention, from the date of incorporation, October 9th, 1918.

Two songs, well and ably rendered by Miss Lemmon, accompanied by Miss P. Devlin, were very much enjoyed by the members present.

It was resolved that the pool room would in future be closed from 7.30 p.m. on Monday evenings for the duration of the general meeting held on that day.

The musical and dramatic committee is arranging a concert to take place in the City Hall, at which Knight McGregor, the famous Scotch-Canadian baritone will sing.

More Returned Men Coming.
A special train carrying seven officers and 274 men from the SS. Carmania for Military District No. 2, passed through Moncton, N.B., at four o'clock on Tuesday afternoon. It is expected that they will arrive in the city on Wednesday night or Thursday morning, unless the storm interferes with the progress of the train. These men have been granted furlough, and will be dropped off at their destinations en route. No details have as yet been received as to the number of Kingstonians in the party.
