Military Matters

New Year's day will be a full holiday for the troops of the Kingston Garrison, and a half-holiday for the clerical staff of the military district.

Q. M. S. I. MacDonald, Instructional Cadre, M. D. No. 3, has been transferred from the 2nd Depot Battalion, R.C.R., to "B" Company, No. 3 Canadian Garrison Regiment.

Owing to the unsafe condition of the ice, all skating in the vicinity of the Tete de Pont barracks lake front is forbidden until further orders.

Lieut. W. F. Clarke, M.C., R.C.A., having reported for duty with the R. C. H. A., has been taken on the strength of "C" Battery.

Driver A. E. Bates and Driver J. P. Farrar having proceeded to Victoria, B.C., to join the Siberian Expeditionary Force, have been struck off the strength of the R. C. H. A.

Captain F. A. Palmer, R.C.E., proceeded to Brockville on Monday for duty in connection with engineer depot supplies.

Thirteen N. C. O.'s and men of No. 3 C. A. S. C. Service Company have been granted New Year's leave.

The St. George's A. Y. P. A. is to entertain all soldiers in St. George's hall Tuesday evening.

The first depot battalion, E. O. R., Belleville, has made considerable progress in demobilizing, being reduced to the organization and about seventy men on leave of absence. It is expected that in about two weeks more the unit, as such, will be closed up. The officers who compose the staff under Lieut.-Col. Smart have done excellent work since the battalion was organized.

C. S. M. I. R. S. Dow and C. S. M. I. J. H. Sharpe, of the Instructional Cadre, are to-day struck off the strength of the C. E. F. on general demobilization. Both of these non-commissioned officers were most efficient and rendered valuable service in the training of officers and N.C.O.'s of the different battalions organized in M. D. No. 3.

FRENCH ARE ADVANCING TO KIEV, UKRAINE

(Canadian Press Despatch)
Constantinople, Dec. 1.—A volunteer army and a French force are advancing from Rumania through Bessarabia towards Kiev, the Ukrainian capital, according to a report from Odessa. The Allied forces now control the Black Sea coast and the British have occupied Batoum, which is connected by a pipe line with the oil center of Baku on the Caspian Sea.

DO YOUR "BIT"

Or Pay the City for Expense of Removing Snow.

County Cases.

A case in which a Pittsburgh farmer was charged with non-payment of wages to a farm hand was booked for hearing before Justice of the Peace George Hunter, Tuesday, but was settled out of court, the farmer paying \$73.50. The amount asked for was \$84. A resident of the county, charged by a government inspector with feeding unwholesome food to pigs, was fined \$25 and costs, or one month in jail.
