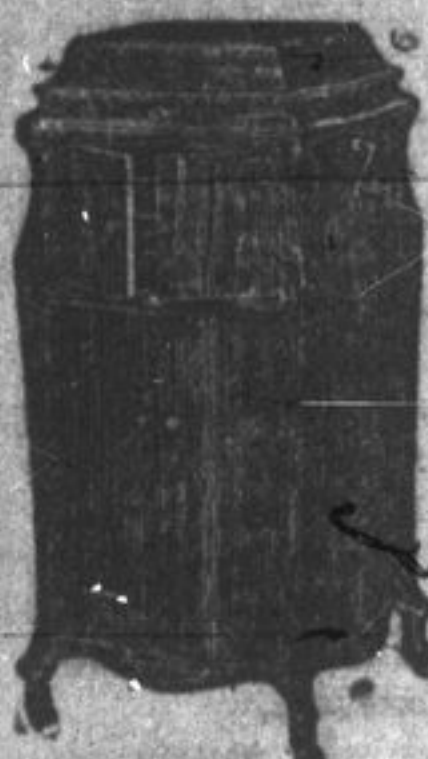

SOCIETY IS AN EVOLUTION

GREAT WAR A LONG TIME IN THE MAKING

A Writer States That History Will Show That War in its Origin Was Economic Rather Than Political. (To the Editor): How many even stop to think that society is an evolution, and has taken ages to arrive at its present stage of development, and will take ages more to reach a development that is in the minds of some who have given thought and study to the subject? It seems there are but few among scientific and social students, who apprehend the full significance of the through all that man cognizes of the universe. Social evolution follows the same principles as physical evolution. Science tells us of the many ages it has taken to develop the earth to the stage for the habitation of man—who has been on the earth only a very brief period in comparison to its age; and it will take ages yet for man to evolve a stable and equitable form of society over all the earth.

In the earlier ages of the earth there were great eruptions, upheavals and cataclysms, but the old earth has never reached a more stable equilibrium. The forces governing physical evolution have done their work, but the forces governing social evolution are in the cataclysmic stage yet, as witness the war, the social eruptions and upheavals in Europe. War and revolutions are spectacular stages in the evolution of society, like earthquakes and volcanoes in the physical realm of nature. It is only by looking at the world in this natural, and scientific way, that we can come to any reasonable conclusion as to the cause and course of events now on the stage in the world of drama.

The great war was a long time in the making. It was not the result of a few centuries, but of ages of human history were back of it. He who would trace the causes of the war to their sources will have to go back to the beginning of human society. This is a long story, and we will have to leave to the historian and political economist. History will show that the war in its origin and inception was economic rather than political. If we do not recognize this and act accordingly, any political peace we may patch up, or league of nations form, will be the only another "paper" century's old down-trodden of earth must have their "place in the sun." The land of the various peoples of the world, of which they have been robbed and disinherited, must be restored to them, and there must be a more equitable distribution of the products of industry.

The time is past for ever when the capitalist, so-called, can do as he likes with those whom he employs. We must have a more equitable distribution of wealth than has obtained hitherto. We hope that the awful war through which we have passed has made it possible for this to be done, but if it has not, then the future will hold in store for us greater trouble than the world has yet known. It is not good to be pessimistic, but it is a little discouraging to hear some saying they would like things to return to the state they were before the war. Every one ought to know that cannot be, and working to restore the old order of things will only create more friction and retard progress. We have arrived at a stage in the world's history when we must move on or be destroyed. There is no backward course in nature. Evolution moves on and up for ever.
