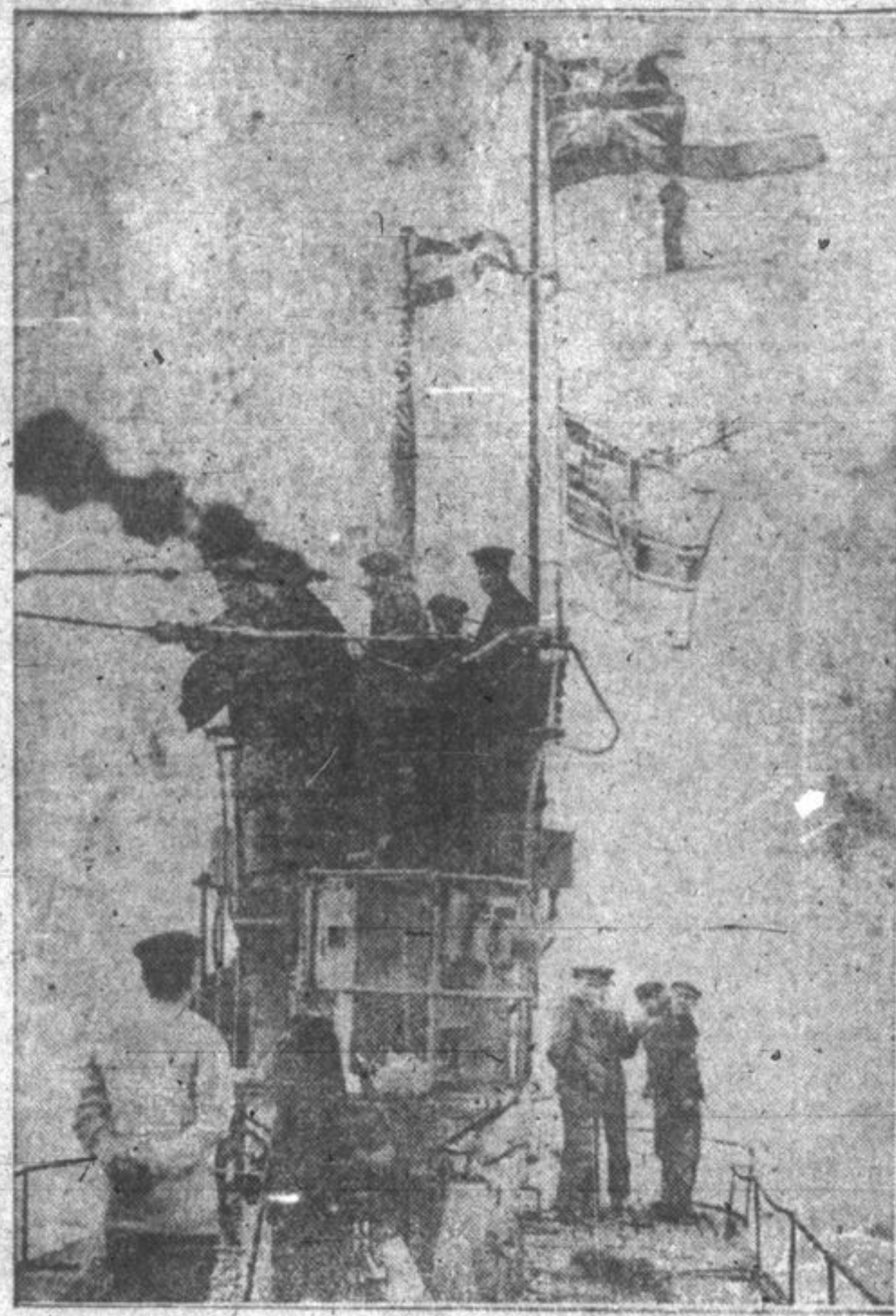

#### BATTERSEA NEWS BUDGET

##### W. J. ANGLIN REMEMBERED BY THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Superintendent For Nearly Forty Years—Corpl. Warren Hartley and Pte. Cyril Smallman Return From Overseas.

Battersea, Dec. 31.—The annual Christmas tree entertainment of the Methodist Sunday school was held in the Orange Hall on Christmas Eve. Notwithstanding the fierce storm which held forth outside the hall was full to the doors. The entertainment provided by the school was of a high order, especially the flag drill put on by Mrs. Codling's class of girls, including a recitation on "The Flag" by Miss Alice Jamieson, and a chorus by the class. A good dialogue entitled, "You're Dreaming," was well put on by Miss E. Anglin's class, assisted by two of the girls, and a splendid chorus, "Take Me Back to Canada," by the ladies' adult Bible class.

The tree was well laden with gifts for the children and some of the "grown ups." Santa Claus was represented by Fred Langford. At the close of the entertainment the superintendent, W. J. Anglin, was presented with a handsome framed oak Morris chair on behalf of the Sunday school, accompanied by an address eulogizing him for his long and faithful services as senior superintendent. Mr. Anglin was taken completely by surprise, but replied feelingly and gratefully in accepting the gift. He has filled the position for about forty years. Corpl. Warren Hartley and Pte. Cyril Smallman have returned from overseas. They enlisted in 1915, and went over with the 14th. The former was only fifteen years of age when he joined up. Both reached France and saw considerable service. Pte. Smallman was severely wounded in the back and left arm at the battle of Courcellette. Corpl. Hartley came through almost unscathed. When his real age was discovered he was taken out of the trenches and put into the tailoring department. Subsequently he was given an officer's training course and won his stripes.

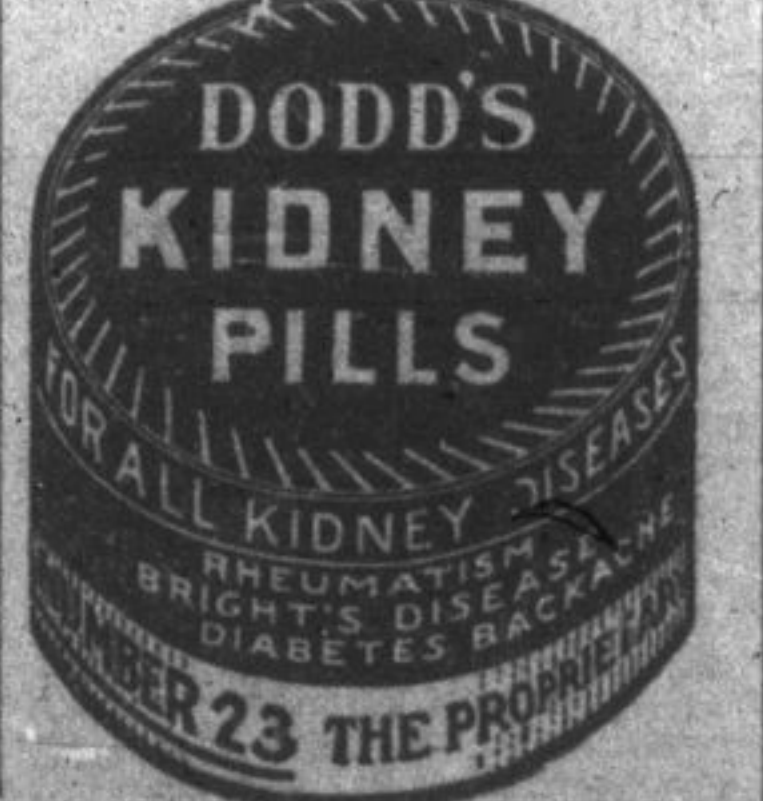

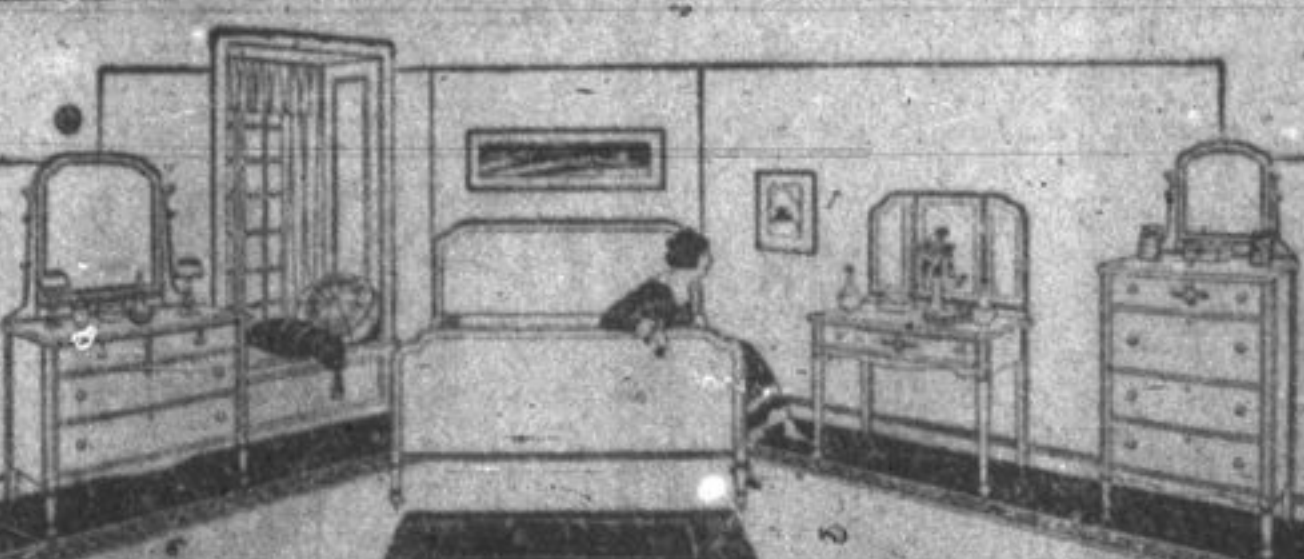
