**THE CAT-O'-NINE TAILS**

WAS USED ON SUCH BOYS WHO COMMITTED THEFT.

They Did \$500 Damage to Government Water Pumping Station—They Had Keys Which Gained Them Admission to Buildings.  
 The cat-o-nine tails had to work overtime at the police station on Friday morning, for no less than six bad boys, with the consent of their parents, were given a taste of the cat. Needless to say, they did not like it.  
 The youngsters are the members of a band of boys who have been committing a series of burglaries around the city and vicinity. All pleaded guilty when before Magistrate Farrell, and the latter was of the opinion that it was a dose of the cat-o-nine tails, that the unruly boys needed, and so ordered this as their medicine.  
 The boys robbed several stores and in addition to this made a raid on the government pump at Barriefield, which is used to pump the water from the river to the camp, and practically stripped the pump of every piece of brass, and sold it. It is understood that damage to the extent of about \$500 and perhaps more was done. The boys also stole a large quantity of copper wire, while in their raids on stores they got away with tobacco, candy, gum and shoe laces, and a lot of small, but useful articles.  
 An incident which was not down on the programme occurred while a constable was giving one lad a dose of the cat-o-nine tails. As the youngster was taking his dose, a parcel accidentally dropped out of his pocket on to the floor, and on investigation it was found to contain some articles which had been reported stolen from a store two nights ago. As a result there is further trouble for the boy. One of the lads had thirty or more keys in his possession, and it is believed that with the use of the keys they secured an entrance to many places.

**REV. DR. SYMONDS SPEAKS.**

"Church Union" Common in Front Line Trenches.  
 The work of the Canadian Chaplain Service among the troops overseas is praised by the Rev. Dr. Symonds in a letter to his congregation. He says: "It is the simple truth to say that the Canadian Chaplain Service is a united church, and the striking success which it has achieved may fairly be claimed as a powerful testimony to the value of unity. In only one respect is the denominational distinction observed, viz., in the celebration of the holy communion, when an Anglican must be the celebrant at an Anglican service, and a Presbyterian at a Presbyterian service."  
 Dealing with reconstruction problems, Dr. Symonds directs the attention of his congregation to an appeal from all the churches of Great Britain (with the exception of the Roman Catholic church) which appeared in the London Times, inviting people to combine a new ideal of international relations as opposed to the old "Balance of Power," and old diplomacy. He says this is a line of unquestionable progress, and hopes all Canadians "will pursue it thoughtfully and intelligently."

**Military Matters**

The reduced fares which have been allowed officers, nursing sisters and men of the Canadian Expeditionary Force while travelling on furlough have been discontinued.

Capt. Pearce, information officer, was formerly with the 139th Northumberland Battalion and was also formerly publisher of the Campbellford Dispatch.

Lieut.-Col. John F. Kidd, who is honored with the title of C.M.G., is the well-known Ottawa surgeon who was over in 1915 with Queen's University Medical Unit. He returned to Canada recently in poor health due to overwork at the front, and is now in Kingston on duty at Queen's Military Hospital.

Major Arthur Black, Ottawa; Major Philip Earnshaw, Almonte; Elliott Greene, R.M.C. graduate, have all been awarded the D.S.O.

Sir Archibald Cameron MacDonnell, K.C.B., C.M.G., one of the best known and popular officers of the Canadian west, has been given the D.S.O.

Capt. Black, of Ottawa, late of the 21st Battalion, C.E.F., has been appointed A.P.M., M.D., No. 3, and he arrived in the city on Friday morning to take over the duties from Major Porter. Capt. Black is one of the original 21st officers, and he served with that unit continuously up to April 21st, 1919. He was wounded several times and is incapacitated by the severance of a nerve in the leg. He returned to Canada in June last.

Major W. J. Cook and Capt. J. V. Doyle, of Belleville, returned from overseas on Thursday. They went overseas in the 155th Battalion.

The 1st Depot Battalion, E.O.R., which went into winter quarters at Belleville, will return to Kingston at an early date, and will be wound up in accordance with demobilization orders.
