OVER 100 VESSELS TO WINTER AT KINGSTON.

Waterfront Is Well Taken Up With Steamers, Lake Barges and Schooners—Means Much to Kingston in Expenditure For Fitting Out In The Spring.

Kingston has quite a large fleet of vessels laid up in the harbor this winter. A visit around the harbor shows that the waterfront is well filled with vessels. Upwards of one hundred boats are laid up here, and this means much to the city, as men have to be employed looking after these vessels during the winter, and the fitting out of them in the spring means the expenditure of quite a large sum of money. BOARD OF PENSIONS ANNOUNCE INCREASES

To Children and Brothers or Sisters of Pensioners.

The local Board of Pensions have been notified of an increase of allowances, which are to be made to children and brothers or sisters of pensioners.

Children and brothers or sisters allowance increased as follows:

First child of family, \$12 per month; second child, \$10 per month, third and subsequent children, \$8 per month. Previously the amount was \$8 per month.

First orphan child, \$24; second orphan child, \$20; third and subsequent children \$16; the above to be retroactive to Sept. 1st, 1918. Previously the amount was \$16.

All children of disability, pensions increased similarly on a sliding scale in proportion to disability.

LONDON AND LANCASHIRE LIFE
