### UNABLE TO COME HOME

Major Albert Stroud Had to Return On the Tunisian.



Major A. M. Stroud, who came over on the S.S. Tunisian as conducting officer, did not have time to make even a flying visit to his home in Kingston. He had to return at once aboard the Tunisian. His wife went to Montreal on Saturday to meet him. Major Stroud went overseas in May, 1915, with the 21st Battalion and was six months at the front with this unit as signalling officer. He was taken ill with appendicitis and had to be taken to England for an operation. After recovery, he was transferred to the Canadian Engineers and became commandant of the signal school with the Engineers at South Camp, Seaford, which position he has since held. The school is now being closed.

### RETURNED MEN ARRIVE

Sixty-one Came Here on Monday Afternoon. A party of fifty other ranks for this military district left St. John, N.B., at 10:30 on Saturday night and arrived here on Monday afternoon by C.P.R. These men, who are from the S.S. Tunisian, have been granted furlough, and those for points east of Kingston were dropped off en route. A party of seven other ranks with their families left St. John by special train at eight o'clock on Saturday night. The remnants of the party, one officer and eleven men, came on to Kingston. The Kingston and district men in the party were: Pte. H. Ferry, S. Halliday, and Gunner C. W. Van Horne, Kingston; Capt. K. McLaughlin, Argenteau; A. W. Skuffham, R. A. Thompson, Picton; W. P. Ackerman, Belleville, and G. H. Small, Campbellford.
