CONCERT IN CITY HALL HAD SUFFERED FOR FOURTEEN YEARS
Couldn't Lift an Arm or Leg From Bed—Tanlac Restores Health.
 Knight MacGregor, Toronto Vocalist, Provided the Chief Part of a Very Enjoyable Programme.
 The grant concert of the G.W.V.A. in the City Hall on Tuesday evening, although somewhat disappointing as regards the size of the audience, provided a musical treat for those present such as is seldom offered to a Kingston crowd. The event was under the patronage of Brig-Gen. Victor S. Williams, who was present, this being his first public appearance since taking over the position of G.O.C. in Kingston.
 Knight MacGregor, the Toronto artist who provided the major part of the programme, fully realized the expectations of those present. He offered a varied repertoire of songs, and showed that he was equally at home in either simple ballads, plantation melodies and selections from grand opera. In all he supplied twenty-one numbers, three of which were encores. The gems of the programme were "The Prologo" from "Pagliacci" and "La Donna Mobile" from "Rigoletto," which the artist rendered in the original Italian; "Dear Old Pal of Mine," a very effective little ballad written in the trenches; "I Want to be Ready," a negro spiritual ballad which delighted the audience, and "The Laddies Who Fought and Won," which Mr. MacGregor sang as an encore with great vigor and expression.
 In every one of his numbers Mr. MacGregor showed himself to be an admirable concert soloist. He is gifted with a splendid platform manner, and his voice is of a rich full tone and of great range and power. His dramatic art was at all times apparent, and his work was greatly appreciated and heartily applauded by those present. Those who did not attend this recital certainly missed hearing an artist of rare ability and skill, one whose equal is very rarely heard in this city.
 Mr. MacGregor was ably assisted by Miss Edna Wallace, pianist, who accompanied him to perfection, and showed a complete understanding of the finer points of the classical items on the programme. Miss Goldie Bartels rendered violin solos in her usual finished manner, and Miss O. F. Teilmann added to the programme by two well rendered readings.

WEEK OF PRAYER SERVICE
IN FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH TUESDAY EVENING
 Rev. Dr. Wilson Spoke on "The Church Universal"—A Strong Appeal For Christian Unity.
 The second service of the Week of Prayer was held on Tuesday evening in the First Congregational church. There was a large congregation. The service was conducted by the Rev. De Courcy Raynor and the special preacher was Rev. R. J. Wilson of Chalmers Presbyterian church. It was essentially a prayer meeting and representative clergymen and laymen led in prayer.
 Rev. Dr. Wilson's subject was "The Church Universal," and he took a comprehensive view of the Christian church which fifty years ago was divided by theologians that no longer constitute divisions. There now exists a spirit of unity in essentials. This was strikingly noticeable in the allotment of territory in the foreign mission fields. But it was not in the foreign mission field that the need for unity was felt. He directed attention to the grave menace to the existing order of society everywhere and to the church itself. The Bolshevik and I.W.W. propaganda threaten our social life and an age of terror is bound to follow the ascendancy of socialism. In western Canada there are no less than eighty different languages spoken. The church must take united action for her own safety as well as for the kingdom of God.
 He believed that Christian missionary effort of the past century had kept India loyal during the past four years, and this relief from the German fear was awakening a new consciousness in the people of that country.
 The church is today presented with an unfinished task and may well be on her knees. It is time to give thanks for a measure of unity but also to seek the spirit that will give driving force and energy for the great task before her. Dr. Wilson's address was a powerful appeal for Christian unity in dealing with the stupendous responsibility that rests upon the church today. "We are here to do, to seek a spirit, and surely we will never do more than the will of God."
 Miss Woolgar sang "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say," by Rathbun very effectively during the service.
