GUNNER WILLIAM KINCH

Writes From Mons—He Is Now In Germany.

Mrs. J. Kinch, 188 Rideau street, has received a letter from her son, Gunner William Kinch, who is with the 33rd Battery, C.F.A., now in Germany. The letter was written at Mons on December 5th, and tells of the feelings of the boys over there when they received the news that the Germans had given in. He says that during the last night before the armistice the Canadian guns never ceased, and that while they were firing, the civilians supplied the boys with drinks. When the news was received the boys were somewhat relieved, and could hardly credit it. At the time of writing the letter, Gunner Kinch was billeted in a private house in the town of Mons. He went overseas with the 33rd Battery from Kingston, went to France in 1916, and was at the front in all the big engagements for twenty-eight months without receiving a scratch.

Peace Conference Procedure

London's Red Cross campaign, aiming at \$75,000, raised \$35,765.50 the first day.

All restrictions in the shipment of egg size anthracite coal has been removed by the U.S. Fuel Administration.
