TRANSPORTS ON RHINE.

The American Suggestion For Relieving French Railways.

Coblenz, Jan. 8.—It has been suggested that as soon as the peace preliminaries are signed the American army of occupation should be kept for any length of time in Germany, may use the Rhine for getting its supplies. Transportation from the French ports over the French railroads and then over the German lines is presenting many difficulties, which make the transportation situation of the third army far from good. It has already been suggested that the army be moved homeward via the Rhine in order to take some of the burden off the overtaxed and run-down French systems.
