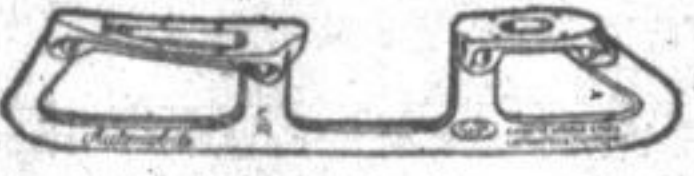

Little Belgium's Sportsmen.

Sporting chronicles throw curious sidelights upon the recent war. In the last few months of the fighting the newspapers contained only scanty notices of the Belgian army, said papers being engrossed with the achievements of their own troops, but the Belgians were suffering heavy losses, the extent of which may never be fully appreciated. The effort to revive sport in the King Albert's country is proving exceedingly difficult because of the scarcity of men and boys capable of engaging in Belgium's favorite pastimes. Some track and boxing fixtures had been arranged during the recent summer by Belgian soldier-athletes. They had to be cancelled because of the killing or wounding of the prospective competitors. No more impressive, if mute, testimony to the sacrifice of the Belgian army and people could be offered. These cancellations were made when the Germans were on the run, and not when the Germans were overwhelming the entente lines in a big drive.

Enlarge the Circuit.

Expansion of the Pacific Coast Baseball League from a six to an eight-team organization, by the addition of Portland and Seattle, has been agreed upon by directors of the league. The directors voted to apply for the Portland and Seattle territories now embraced in the Pacific Coast International League, formerly the North-western League, and it is expected plans for the changes in the circuit will be completed at a meeting to-day.

Major Hockey Coaches.

Winnipeg Argonauts, who are called to win the senior championship of the Manitoba Hockey Association, and challenge for the Allan Cup, are being coached by Major Francis Caldwell and Major Les Moffat, both of whom were players on the Winnipeg Victorias when the latter held the cup. Caldwell went overseas with the 44th Battalion, and not only won his majority on the field but was awarded the Distinguished Service Order.

CORNELL TO INSIST

On Every Man Taking Part in Some Sport.

Denial that President Schurman of Cornell University is seeking the abolition of inter-collegiate athletics at Cornell was made in a statement issued by R. W. Sailor, Director of the campaign to finance Cornell sports this year. In a recent report to the trustees, Dr. Schurman had recommended that inter-collegiate athletics be "displaced" by a system of intramural sport. Dr. Schurman's recommendation, Mr. Sailor said, contemplated retention of inter-collegiate sports with the addition of intra-collegiate sports designed to provide physical training for every student. It would not serve any ends to abolish inter-collegiate athletics," Dr. Schurman is quoted as having said.

Vogue of Golf in Canada.

Canadian Golfer—There will be new golf courses literally by the score laid out in Canada this year. As a matter of fact even the war has not proved a deterrent and many new courses have been put into commission since 1914. Notable examples in Ontario have been Kingston, Midland, Carleton Place, Camp Borden, Weston, Britannia, Muskoka, Quebec—Grand Mere, sur-le-lac, Granby, St. Margarets, Vale, St. Bruno and Senneville, Manitoba—Birtle, Assinboine, Winnipeg—Canoe Club, Winnipeg, New Brunswick—Fredericton, Riverview, Moncton, Nova Scotia—Dartmouth, Digby, British Columbia—Colwood, Invermere, Cranbrook, Balfour, Alberta—Bowness, Calgary, Edmonton Golf Club (playing over the municipal links), Lethbridge, Saskatchewan—Kerrobert, Qu'Appelle.

This makes a total of twenty-nine new clubs which can be rightly termed "golf war babies." In addition, Chatham is also "getting into the game," land having been secured for a course which will be laid out this year. If all this activity has been registered in war time, besides several courses enlarged from 9 to 18 holes, what will be the record when thousands of soldiers return who learned the game in Great Britain and have become enthusiastic about its many physical and mental possibilities and advantages?

Want Foreign Athletes.

Plans for a gigantic revival of amateur sports is seen in the action of the U.S. Amateur Athletic Union, which has forwarded invitations to several foreign countries asking them to send athletic teams over in search of laurels during the year.

If foreign athletes can arrange to visit the United States it is planned to have them enter competition against star teams here and later arrange for meets in other cities, such as Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, St. Louis and San Francisco, it is said.

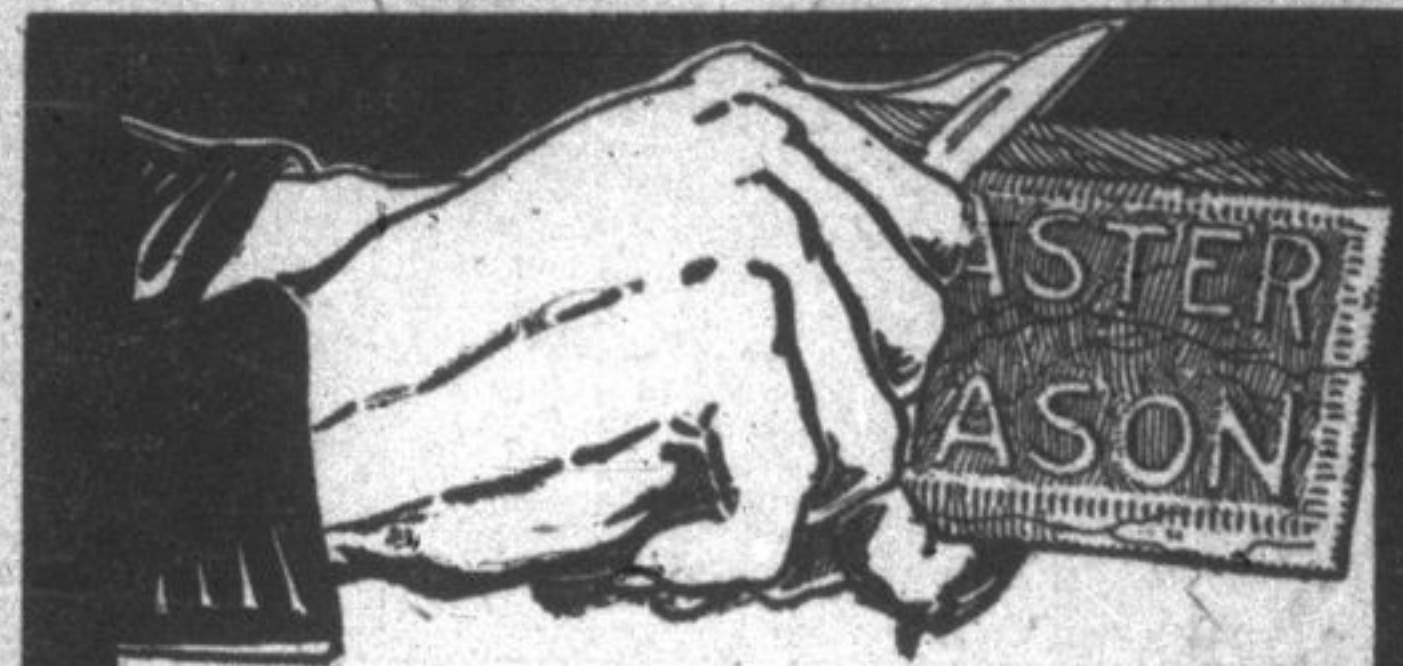
