Russian Symphony Orchestra. Musicians, lovers of music, teachers, pupils and the citizens of Kingston in general will rejoice at the glad news that one of New York City's greatest attractions will be at the Grand Opera House on Friday night, Jan. 10th. This great event will be a concert given by the Russian Symphony Orchestra, Modest Altschuler, conductor. This organization is sponsored by prominent men and women in the United States, among whom is Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter of President Wilson, herself a splendid musician. Speaking of this orchestra, Miss Wilson says: "They do play so beautifully that all who can do so hear them." Not only does this orchestra interpret Russian music in a masterful way, but American, French and Italian compositions are rendered with that same exquisite refinement that shows the true artistic skill of the performer. Two wonderful soloists are making this tour with the orchestra, and each one is worthy of an audience to fill the house, so well do they perform. Vera Janacopolus, a young dramatic soprano whose singing is considered wonderful in France and New York City, where she recently made her debut, and Waseley Beskirsky, a violinist of great merit.

"Turn to the Right." Regeneration through mother-love is the theme of "Turn to the Right!" the play which the United Producing Company Limited, will present at the Grand Opera House on Saturday, January 11th, matinee and night, for a special return engagement. Though labeled a laughing hit, it is said to surpass "Brewster's Millions," "The Fortune Hunter" and "The Boomer-

ang"—all Winchell Smith successes in strength of story and actual dramatic merit. The story of "Turn to the Right!" deals with the regeneration of Joe Basson, an erring but honest-hearted boy, who returns to his old home after serving a term in Sing Sing prison. On the day of his return his saintly old mother and his sister are threatened with ejection by Deacon Tillinger, the town skinflint. They are unable to pay a grocery bill contracted at his old home, and he has taken steps to seize their little fruit farm. In the midst of the Basson's family council appear two old pals of Joe—Muggs, a pickpocket, and Gilly, a safe-burglar. Like Joe, they have just been released from Sing Sing. The thimble-skinned crooks think and act quickly in "putting it over" on Deacon Tillinger and the farm is saved.

"Harry Lauder." Writing on "Leathly Amusement" in the London Star, the famous "Alpha" among other things pays tribute to Harry Lauder, who will be seen here en route to Australia at the Grand Opera House on Tuesday evening, Jan. 14th: "The mind needs its holidays as well as the body, and the fact that you have no taste for nonsense is not evidence of a superior person, but of a learned dullard. The more serious the habit of life, the more irresponsible, should be its amusements. I like to think of Gladstone singing, 'Camptown Races' and of the solemn mathematician, Dodgson, creating the glorious nonsense world of 'Alice in Wonderland. I know a theologian, one of the most distinguished scholars of his time, who releases his mind in wild gambols among the silliest novels, and would no more think of missing an occasional visit to a cinema than of missing his morning shave. And who can blame the charming fun with which Harry Lauder has seasoned the life of his time? I confess that when his number is announced I am transplanted. The witchery of that droop figure infects child in fairyland, as obedient to the enchanter's as the children of Hamelin town were to the piping of the Pied Piper. In most haggard moments I can exercise the demon of disquiet by recalling that odd walk, that delightful chuckle, the pauses, the pocket-searchings, and the ancient jests of the incomparable Harry."

Good Housekeeping for January begins a new and striking serial by James Oliver Curwood, "The River's End," a story of the great Northwest. The children and the women of the future are forecasted by two masterly articles, "Community Mothering," by Oliver Howard Dunbar, and "Women and Marriage," by W. L. George the famous English feminist. The latest article from Clara Savage, staff correspondent in France, takes the reader right behind the lines. A charming bit of frivolity is "An Episcopal Scherzo," by Ida A. R. Wylie, which proves that she who does one thing well does all things well. Miss Wylie is a living proof of the versatility of genius.

Good Housekeeping announces the opening of a new department of Household Engineering to supplement the work of the institute in cookery. The up-to-date housekeeper is no longer content to begin and end with recipes. This new department will give her intelligent command of every detail of her home. The new food situation—even more vital since the ending of the

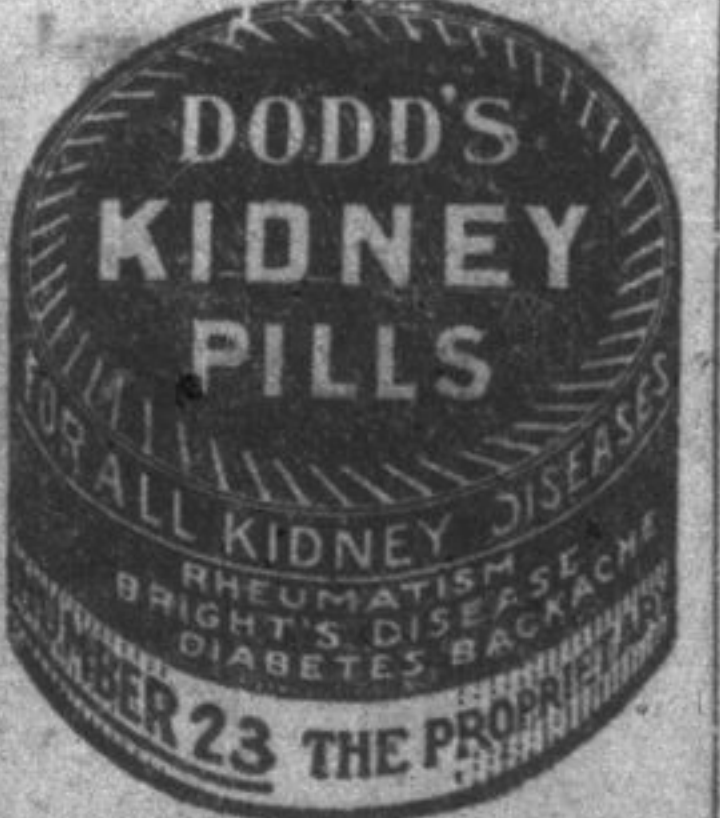

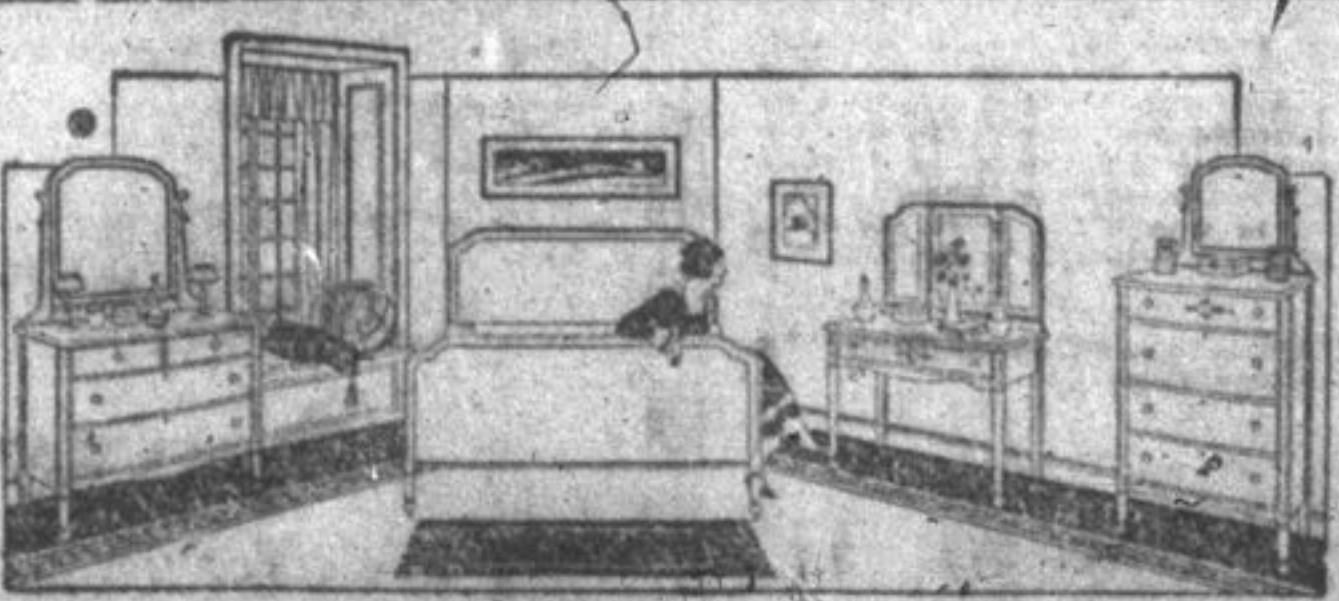
