Very mild weather prevails this week in Saskatchewan.
Rev. Edward Cockburn, librarian of Knox College, Toronto, is dead.
Congressman-elect Beager of the Milwaukee Leader and four other Socialists were found guilty of treason by a jury at Chicago.
The Union Bank will pay a 10 per cent. dividend and sell the balance of the authorized capital to shareholders at \$160 per share.
The three-year old daughter of Mrs. Henry Oliver, in Sandwich West, died of influenza, the fifth victim in the family within two weeks.
At the Northland inquiry in Ottawa, Major Westmore, O.C., the conducting party, said he and his staff would be well satisfied to continue attached to that ship so long as she continued transporting troops to Canada.
Three years' imprisonment in penitentiary and a fine of \$500 or further six months imprisonment, was the sentence imposed by Magistrate Kingston, Thursday, on Charles Watson, former Toronto policeman, convicted of having objectionable political literature in his possession.
Careful consideration was promised by Hon. W. D. McPherson, provincial secretary on behalf of Ontario government in regard to resolutions of the Ontario Association for Municipalities giving municipalities greater control of their own streets against company owned utilities.

Military Matters

An effort is being made by Kingston Branch of the Great War Veterans' Association to secure for this city the services of one of the lecturers now touring Canada giving lectures on the subject of "Repatriation and Employment of Soldiers." The department of soldiers' civil re-estabishment at Ottawa are arranging these lectures, and the G.W.V.A. are anxious to have Kingston included in their itinerary. One of the official lecturers is to be in this district towards the latter end of January, and it is probable that he will be secured for this city.
The records of Hull subdivision of the district registrar under the M. S. A. have been forwarded to Kingston, and the Hull office, which was conducted by Col. Labell, has been closed. These records will be filed with those at the head office here, which is engaged in putting the files in shape to form future reference. When the work is completed it is expected that it will form an important part of the archives at Ottawa.

It is stated that Lieut.-Col. C. C. Bennett, who has been A. A. G. at headquarters M. D. No. 2 since September last, is slated for a post at Victoria, B.C.

An important increase in clothing allowance for the men of the R.A.F. has just been made. The allowance which was formerly \$14.44, has been increased to \$35, and those men who have been discharged will have the difference sent to them by mail.

A picture appears in the London Illustrated Herald on December 15th which shows the 21st Battalion color party with their colors at Westminster Abbey, where they were handed over so that they could be taken into Germany at the head of the battalion. In two color party are Sergeant-Major Jordan of Picton, and Sergeant Cross of Marmora, along with other members of the 21st Battalion.
