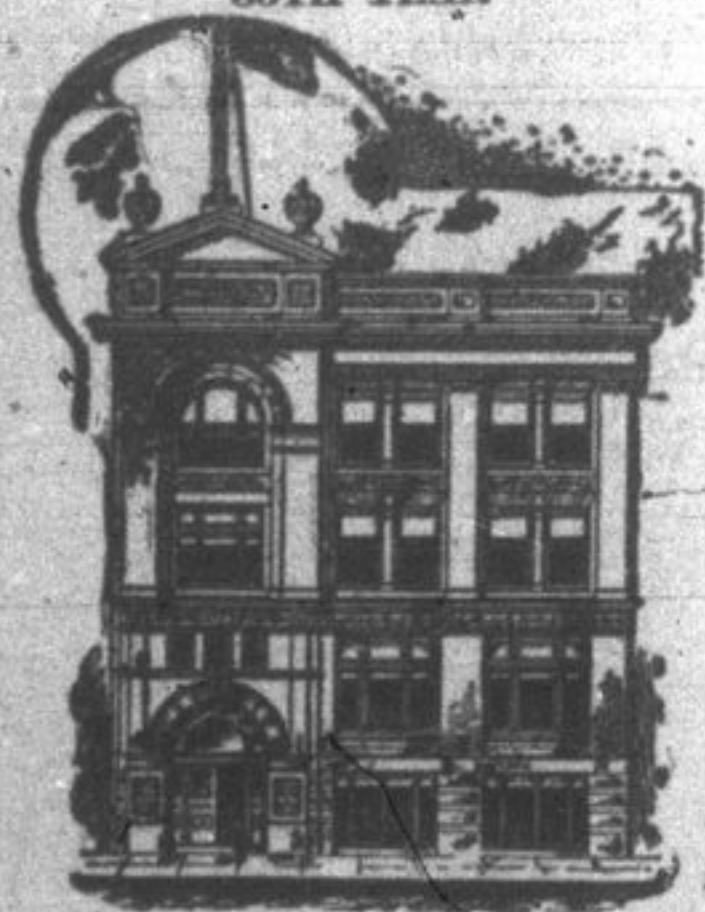


THE BRITISH WHIG 85TH YEAR

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MADE AN HEROIC EFFORT TO SAVE JAMES DEVINE, KILLED BY FREIGHT TRAIN.

Verdict of "Accidental Death" Rendered by Jury in Sad Fatality at Kingston Junction Sunday Afternoon.

The story of the heroic attempt Alexander McDonald, car foreman for the Grand Trunk Railway, made to save the life of James Devine, who met death on Sunday afternoon, at Kingston Junction, when he was run over by a freight train, was told to Coroner Dr. D. E. Mundell and a jury at the inquest held on Monday afternoon.

McDonald said he was at the outer station Sunday afternoon at 1.15 o'clock, when a freight train was pulling out on its way east.

After the witness had related the part he had played in attempting a rescue, Coroner Mundell stated that McDonald was deserving of great praise for his work.
