THE WANDERER PRODUCED
 AT THE GRAND OPERA HOUSE THURSDAY EVENING
 A Great Biblical Play, Magnificently Presented—At the Grand For the Remainder of the Week.
 A spectacle of great splendor, a theme of a high moral order and some magnificent acting characterized the production of "The Wanderer" at the Grand Opera House on Thursday evening, when the company of Elliott, Comstock and Gest presented this splendid biblical play. The story of the play is one as old as the Christian religion, that of the Prodigal Son, and the story gains much in its dramatized version. The first scene shows the young man, Jether, at his father's home amongst the hills of Judaea, restless and chafing under the restraint of the quiet country life, and eager to go out and see the great outside world, where he hopes to make his fortune. After much persuasion, he induces his father to give him his portion, and he departs from the old home, leaving his parents in despair.
 He is next seen in the city of Jerusalem, where he is installed in a palace, surrounded by all kinds of luxury, and having as companions a host of dissolute and wanton men and women. He is shown wasting all his money in pleasure, and by and by his generosity leaves him penniless. In this scene the setting and decorative scheme of the stage are most luxurious, and the picture of the gilded palace of the wealthy is well portrayed. But the young man's money does not last for ever, and after renouncing his God, he is flung out, naked and penniless, into the street.
 He comes the return home to his father's house, suffering and in rags, where he is met by his haughty elder brother, and treated rudely. But his mother's love is greater than his brother's wrath, and he is in the end made welcome, and is received with joy.
 The play is staged with the usual disregard for expense which is a feature of all Belasco productions. Not only is the scenery of a magnificent order, arranged with typical Oriental splendour, but every member of the cast is specially fitted to the part which he or she plays. The star of the play was Florence Auer, who took the part of Huldah, the mother of the prodigal. Her acting was superb, and her voice and gestures in the emotional passages added a touch of realism to the play. Next in order of merit came Frederick Lewis, as "Jether, the Wanderer." He is gifted with an attractive manner, and a remarkably rich voice, which is used to good advantage, especially in the second act. Others who starred were Olga Newton, as Naomi, the cousin and lover of Jether, Richard Thornton as Gaal, his brother, Henry Duggan as Jassu, his father and Louise Orth, as Fisha, the daughter of the owner of the gilded palace in Jerusalem. A feature of the play was the dancing of the ballet of girls, which was led by Mile. Francesca Karmenova, a famous danseuse of International reputation. The whole company was well balanced, and presented a difficult play in masterly fashion.
 The theatre was crowded, and for once the usually conservative Kingstonian is home from the front.

BONE GRAFTS IN THE WAR
DR. HARRY HUNTER OF KINGSTON TELLS WONDERFUL STORY
 Kingstonian Is Home From the Front Describes the Use of Bone Pegs to an Audience in Brooklyn, N.Y.—Germans Absolutely Void of Honor.
 The Brooklyn, N.Y. Eagle, has the following interesting account of an address delivered by Dr. "Harry" Hunter, a graduate of Queen's University, and a son of Justice of the Peace George Hunter:
 "The use of bone pegs in effecting the union of bones shattered by explosive bullets was described by Dr. G. H. V. Hunter, Brooklyn physician, who recently returned after thirteen months' work with the British Army. Dr. Hunter made the interesting statement in the course of an address at the monthly meeting of the Men's Club of the Fourth Avenue M. E. Church.
 "If there is loss of some of the bone substance," said Dr. Hunter, describing his experiences in English and French hospitals, "so that there is a gap in the bone, as often happens as the result of an explosive bullet which blows part of the bone away, it is necessary to resort to the bone graft. By this is meant the taking of a piece of good, healthy bone from the skin and bridging over the space between the fragments. In order to do this a very ingenious little motor saw has been invented by a New York orthopaedic surgeon, Dr. Fred Albee of the Post Graduate Hospital. By this saw a groove can be cut in the broken ends of the bones and the bone graft cut from the skin to exactly fit in the groove. The bone graft is then either tied by means of strong kangaroo tendons or small holes are drilled through it and bone pegs driven in to hold it in place. In six weeks the bone graft has grown fast and the arm is strong again.
 "And now just a word about the kind of foe we have been fighting. Let me tell you, he is a being absolutely void of honor and let none of us get faint-hearted when we hear that the Germans are going to be made to pay to the utmost of their ability.
 "I saw, with my own eyes, a little vial, not over 3 inches long, one of thousands captured by the English during the winter of 1917, and marked in German "Tetanus Antitoxine," an antitoxine used by all armies to ward off lockjaw. Before any of it was used by the English it was thought best to examine it. When tested it was found to contain typhoid germs. There were enough typhoid germs in those vials to infect the whole British army."
