**KINGSTON HOSPITAL NEEDS**

**Local Situation Regarding Tuberculosis Not Satisfactory—The General Hospital is to be Remodeled.**

In a statement just issued, it is pointed out that twenty years ago the Kingston General Hospital had about one thousand patients in a year; now the number approximates five thousand a year, yet there has been no corresponding increase in the population of the city and district.  
 Kingston has not been unmindful of its duty in the provision of hospital accommodation. The General Hospital and Hotel Dieu have kept pace with the progress of medicine and surgery.  
 The growing demands for room at the General Hospital have forced the Board to consider what must be done to meet the wants of the public. Before these plans are completed consideration of the whole hospital system of the city is advisable. Taking stock of the requirements of the city and district as a whole should lead to the adoption of a general policy which will have the approval and consent of all who are interested and at the same time prevent any duplication of effort. This is specially desirable in Kingston where much the same group of people is interested in all the institutions to be reviewed.

It is to be noted, first, that the local situation regarding the care of tuberculosis is not satisfactory. It is a situation forced upon us by the war and the needs of the tubercular soldier. The Dominion Government has possession of the Mowat Hospital till three years after the war. In the meantime there are two cottages on the grounds of the Hotel Dieu for the care of incipient cases and advanced bed cases are admitted to the wards and private rooms of both hospitals. The Mowat Hospital has been enlarged by the Government beyond any possible local requirements of the present or early future. Three years after the war will not terminate the need for the hospital for the care of soldiers. So it is unlikely that the Government will wish to give it up at that date. At the Mowat all classes of cases, incipient, advanced, incurable and dying are all cared for; but experience has shown that better results are secured when the curable and incurable advanced cases are separated. With these facts before us it is suggested that the Kingston Health Association should endeavor to enter into an agreement with the Government by which civilian incipient cases will be admitted to the Mowat Hospital under its present management, and that this should be regarded as a more or less permanent arrangement. Advanced and terminal cases should be otherwise provided for.

 advanced tuberculosis, for surgical cases of tuberculosis and also for looking after children with inherited tubercular tendencies, with the object of preventing development of the disease. These are three functions which can be best performed by the General Hospital. A building should be specially designed for these purposes.

The plans of the General Hospital have in view the erection of a new wing for public wards and an outdoor department, and the re-modelling of some of the present building to increase the number of semi-private rooms. That is to say, provision is being made for more and better accommodation for those who can pay only small sums or nothing, at all towards their care. This is very satisfactory for it meets the greatest present need. As the wards are to be small, it will be possible to classify the cases and it is intended that the comforts and care provided will approximate those afforded to patients who are able to pay for anything and everything they require. The enlargement and re-arrangement of the visiting staff already ensures the same medical and surgical attention for poor, middle class and rich alike.

The care of acute infectious diseases is at present under the management of the General Hospital in the Nickle wing. Improved facilities and more beds are urgently needed. The city is never long without epidemics and there are always sporadic cases of diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, chicken-pox and mumps. Better means for dealing with the old cases, in a building at once attractive and comfortable, will result in fewer epidemics. Such a building is included in the General Hospital programme.

The recently opened obstetric department of the Hotel Dieu is deservedly popular and should be enlarged. It is proposed to remodel the Doran building at the General Hospital and to use it exclusively for maternity cases and as a nursery. With the recent increase in venereal diseases and the danger of a greater spread following demobilization, the arrival of the babies and the first aid to be rendered to them, take on a greater interest and value than ever before. Another branch of medical work which should be taken up by the General Hospital at the present time is the psychopathic, i.e., the care of incurable and curable mental cases. The provincial asylums are not properly the recipients of early cases which need to be kept under observation, nor of certain acute curable cases.
