Election Rioting in Berlin.
(Canadian Press Despatch)
London, Jan. 20.—Rioting occurred in Berlin during last night after the Spartans had attempted to destroy the ballot boxes used in Sunday's election, according to a despatch from Copenhagen. The Spartans were repulsed everywhere. Fighting took place in Wilhelmstrasse and Heldenstrasse and at Hallesche Tor.

Military Matters

The hospital ship Essiquibo is expected to reach Halifax on Wednesday, January 22nd, with another shipment of wounded veterans. There are on board for this military district two officers and forty-nine men, one of which is an amputation case and one a tubercular case.

Lieut. F. M. Shuttle, No. 3 C. A. S. C. Service Company, has been struck off the strength of that unit under demobilization orders, and returned to the militia unit to which he formerly belonged.

A court of inquiry assembled at the Tete de Pont barracks at two o'clock on Saturday for the purpose of enquiring into and reporting upon the loss of small arms in charge of No. 2 detachment C. P. A. S. C.

A board of officers, composed of Lieut.-Col. G. H. Gillespie, Lieut. W. F. Clark and Capt. S. Jordan, assembled at the Tete de Pont barracks on Monday afternoon for the purpose of examining and reporting upon the condition of the clothing of the men on the sub-staff, R. C. H. A. depot.

Pte. V. Carton, of the 21st Battalion, one of the party who arrived in Kingston from the SS. Olympic, contracted a bad cold on the way home, and had to be met by an ambulance at the outer station and conveyed from there to hospital. He arrived on the train which reached Kingston at 7.30 p.m.

The men of the 1st Depot Battalion arrived in Kingston from Belleville on Monday morning, and went into their new quarters at the Barrfield barracks. There are at present about seventy men on the active strength of the battalion, with a large number of others on indefinite leave who will be called up from time to time.

The Engineer Depot, M.D. No. 3, has been moved from Brockville to Kingston. The men of that unit arrived in the city on Monday, and are billeted in Barrfield barracks.

Brig.-Gen. Victor S. Williams, G.O.C., inspected the 1st depot battalion at Barrfield on Monday.

Col. Boggs, Lieut. Col. R. Croker, Col. Smart and Major Lancaster proceeded to Ottawa on Monday on Court Martial duty.

Lieut. J. A. Minnes, 23rd Battery, C.F.A., arrived home from France on Monday. He was accompanied by Captain Stewart S. Hawkins, 78th Battalion, and Lieut. S. Stewart, 38th Battalion, of Ottawa.

Major Buehman, travelling representative of the Board of Pensions Commissioners, Ottawa, is in Kingston and will hear complaints.

Lieut. K. E. Taylor has been granted the rank of captain while employed in the district record office.

Capt. E. E. Newcombe has been granted the rank of major whilst acting as deputy assistant adjutant general, headquarters, Ottawa.

Capt. R. J. Orde has been granted the rank of major whilst employed in the branch of the judge advocate general, headquarters, Ottawa.

Honors For Lieut.-Col. Elkins.
Among the Canadians mentioned by Sir Douglas Haig in his despatch of the 8th of November, 1918, as deserving of special mention, as given in a London Gazette supplement dated December 31st, is Lieut.-Col. W. H. P. Elkins, D.S.O., commanding the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery brigade. Lieut.-Col. Elkins was also awarded a bar to the D.S.O.
