KINGSTON FAIR MEETING

THE DIRECTORS PREPARING FOR NEXT FALL'S BIG SHOW.

"Bigger and Grander Than Ever" is the Motto of Manager R. J. Bushell for the Fair of 1919.

The Kingston Industrial Fair is moving along with great success. Every year the board of directors continue their "drive," led on by their ever-hustling manager, R. J. Bushell, who talks and works for the fair 365 days of the year.

The board of directors held their annual meeting in the agricultural rooms, Clarence street, on Monday afternoon, and another year of progress was reported. The report of the auditors, Charles Adair and J. B. Quinn, was presented, and it showed a balance in cash on hand of \$128.35, but added to this is a Victory Bond for \$500, which the association took out. The association went very heavily into repair work this year, and had it not been for this investment the directors would have had a surplus of \$3,000, so this goes to show just how the big fair is progressing.

Mr. Bushell, the manager, was showered with words of praise by all the directors, and during the meeting was given a bonus of \$200 for his hard work.

H. J. Simpson, who has been a member of the Fair Association for thirty years, and who has at all times taken an active interest in the work, had the honor of being elected as president for the year 1919. Colin Rogers, the retiring president, did splendid work, and was warmly thanked by the directors.

"Bigger and grander than ever." This is the motto for the fair of 1919. Before the fair of 1918 was over, Mr. Bushell was hard at work planning for the next year, and from now on he and his colleagues will be on the job, and when the time comes round for the "big show" everything will be ready for the pressing of the button which will mark the opening of the greatest exhibition ever held in Kingston.

In his address, Mr. Bushell made the important announcement that the Kingston Industrial Fair stood pre-eminent as the fair, making the largest progress of any of the 350 fairs held annually in the province of Ontario.

the following items:—Receipts: Balance on hand, \$327.45; legislative grants, \$335; municipal grants, \$400; membership fees, \$232; cash donations, \$1,195; membership fees received in advance for 1919, including sums retained out of prize monies at 1918 exhibition, \$117; admission fees to exhibition, \$5,800.95; rent of grounds, stalls, etc., \$1,009.04; grand stand receipts, \$343.75; legislature grant, \$50.

Expenditure—Cash prizes paid, horses, \$11; cattle, \$177; sheep, \$158; pigs, \$88; poultry, \$235.25; dairy products, \$98.75; grain and seeds, \$29.50; roots and vegetables, \$270.50; fruit and flowers, \$24.25; ladies' work, \$139; boys and girls exhibit, \$40; cash paid standing field crop competition, \$25; meetings or lectures for discussion of agricultural subjects, \$27.65; expenses of delegates to fairs and exhibition convention, including fees to same, \$41.50; services in departmental fair judges, \$56; cash paid for prizes in standing field crop competition (contributed by the department), \$50; amount spent for special attractions (athletic sports, races and music), \$1,915.50; rent, light, fixing up fair buildings and grounds, \$3,547.77; purchase of grounds, erection of buildings and insurance, \$26.50; services of secretary, \$325; auditors, \$30; working expenses, ticket takers, ticket sellers, laborers, mechanics, \$796.50; postage, \$75; livery, \$23; Refreshments, \$10; meals, \$495.25; printing, \$1,200.75; sundries, \$493.57. Total receipts, \$10,960.69; expenditures, \$10,894.24.

Following the report of the auditors, it was decided on motion of James Baxter and E. Braden, to hold a field crop competition in oats and ensilage corn, and that every prize winner be obliged to show a sheaf at the fair.

The Officers Elected.

The election of officers resulted as follows: Honorary presidents—W. F. Nickle, M.P.; Dr. J. W. Edward, M.P.; A. M. Rankin, M.P.P.; A. E. Ross, M.P.; C.M.G.; Brig.-Gen. Victor S. Williams, Col. G. H. Ogilvie, C. A. B. Clark, reeve of Kingston township; George Mattland, reeve of Pittsburg township. President—H. J. Simpson. First vice-president—J. S. Sibbitt. Second vice-president—James Henderson. Secretary-treasurer and manager—R. J. Bushell. Auditors—J. B. Quinn and Chas. Adair.

Board of directors—Colin Rogers, A. C. Day, E. Cook, H. Kohl, A. E. Weller, J. L. F. Sproule, Thomas Boyle, J. J. Wilmot, R. J. Moore, J. A. Wilson, James Baxter and J. A. Wilmot.

Other Business. It was decided to engage departmental judges for the exhibition.

The two auditors were voted \$20 each, and warmly praised for their good work. Mr. Quinn, one of the auditors, gave the directors a number of timely tips as to how they might lighten the work of the secretary, and no doubt they will be carried out.

A motion of Mr. Sproule, to give Mr. Bushell a bonus of \$200, was carried by a unanimous vote. The retiring president, Mr. Rogers, thanked the directors for their warm support during his term of office at this stage, and the newly-elected president, H. J. Simpson, was escorted to the chair amidst much applause. Mr. Simpson stated that he had been identified with the fair for thirty years, and recalled the fact that but on of the present members, A. C. Day, was identified with the fair when he joined.

Mr. Simpson is an active worker in the interests of the fair, is a regular attendant at all the meetings, and under his able guidance the fair of 1919 is bound to be a great success.

R. J. Bushell and Colin Rogers were appointed delegates to the annual meeting of the Fairs Association to be held in Toronto.

Mr. Bushell's Statement. In his address to the directors, Mr. Bushell stated that this was his sixth annual report as manager, and that it showed that the fair had taken no mean part in the uplift of agriculture.

"We have gained experience and are ready for new efforts," said Mr. Bushell. "We are all proud of the part we have taken in this good work. Not only have our efforts been confined to our own county and city, but we are pleased to note that they have permeated to no small extent the whole province, and the Kingston Industrial stands to-day pre-eminent as the fair making the largest progress of any of the 350 fairs held annually in our province. But we are not as much interested in the past as what we are going to do in the future. Six years have been largely years of preparation for greater activities. I anticipated co-operation on the part of the farmers and a closer fellowship which, none can value the results too highly."

"The fact that the Kingston Industrial made such progress in the last six years is something Kingston city and Frontenac county can well be proud of."

Mr. Bushell also paid a warm compliment to the members of the board of directors. He said they worked together in a harmonious manner.

CANADA CAN RAISE STORE OF GOOD SEEDS

Equal if Not Superior to Imported—Experimental Farms Report.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—Experiments carried on at the Central and other Experimental Farms have demonstrated that it is possible to raise in Canada large quantities of seeds of field crops. Particulars of what has been accomplished along this line since the war caused a shortage of seeds in Canada are given in the last annual report on the Dominion Experimental Farms, just issued.

The report states that the seeds raised in Canada are at least equal, if not superior to imported seeds, and that the farms have done good work in providing quantities of "stock seeds" to meet emergencies.

Investigations in the culture proved that part of British Columbia, the south-western part of Ontario, the valley of the St. Lawrence and the Maritime Provinces were suitable for fibre flax production. The report states that during the year 3,650 samples of seed grain,

6,174 samples of potatoes, 1,912 samples of flower seeds, 5,193 samples of fruit trees and 386 samples of other trees, and a large number of other varieties were sent out for trial at the homes of individuals. Special distribution was also made from some of the farms of tobacco seed, corn and vegetable seeds and strawberry plants.
