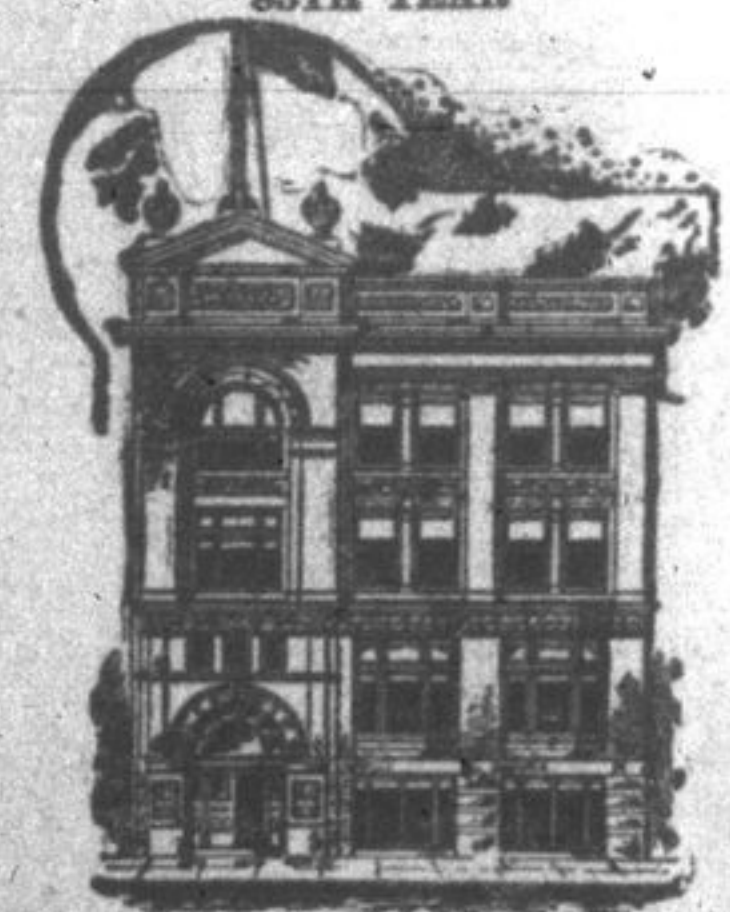

The American press is featuring a picture of Mrs. Corey, wife of the steel magnate, wearing a \$75,000 Russian sable coat. Such a vulgar parading of wealth does more to create discontent among the common people than all the propaganda the Bolsheviks ever put forth.

Rev. Dr. Bland, Winnipeg, and Rev. Dr. S. P. Rose, Ottawa, are into a controversy, in an Ottawa paper, over the Government's work, and it is some controversy, as both are doubtful letter writers. Dr. Rose claims Dr. Bland writes in exaggerated fashion and Dr. Bland retorts that Dr. Rose is affected with cynicism.

In referring to the "outbreak" of spiritualism in Toronto, Rev. G. Burke says: "If spiritualism teaches nothing more than the existence of the other world, then there is certainly nothing antagonistic to the teachings of the Catholic church. But that we can get 14

KINGSTON FACING ISSUES.

Kingston is facing several momentous issues, the decisions on which will affect the city's future. One is the harbor improvements and the other the entrance of the Grand Trunk Railway main line into the city.

The harbor improvements are essential if Kingston is to be the transshipping port for western grain for export. The enlargement and deepening of the Welland Canal demands the deepening of Kingston harbor to correspond with the canal draught.

The second demand, and urgent too, is to have the Grand Trunk main line pass through the city. It will cost money to secure a change in the route, but it will be money well spent if Kingston can be put squarely on the map from a railway viewpoint.

THINGS THAT LIE AHEAD.

There is no cause to be fearful of the future of Canada. A country that fought so well in the war can "carry on" just as successfully in the days of peace. He is a faint-hearted and short-sighted citizen who sees only blue ruin ahead for this country.

Deferred construction programmes, involving the expenditure of millions of dollars, will be proceeded with in the spring, and industrial plants in all parts of Canada are awaiting only for labor to inaugurate large schemes for expansion.

Price levels, it has been ascertained, will be generally maintained. Any possibility of a precipitate fall is precluded by the world-wide demand. No sudden readjustment of wages is anticipated.

By establishing Industrial Research Bureaux it affords valuable aid to existing industries and will foster the creation of new ones. By its programme for the construction of useful public works it will absorb the products of many factories.

It has stimulated the building industry by instituting a credit of twenty-five million dollars to be drawn on for housing development, and it has inaugurated an important ship-building programme. It is providing employment for thousands of men on the government railways.

The opportunities abroad have not been forgotten. The government proposes to establish credits for work undertaken by manufacturers and producers in connection with the rehabilitation of the devastated regions of Europe which should lead to a large share of the business coming to Canada.

Demand For General's Pictures.

During the past week close on nine hundred copies of the photograph of the late Major-General T. B. R. Hemming, which was prepared by the Whig, have been distributed to friends and admirers of the deceased.

Increase For Operators.

G.T.R. telegraph operators have received an increase in wages of \$25 a month over the present scale, dating back to October last, for a working day of eight hours.

Permission has been given to a limited number of selected Canadian students, now with the troops, to study in British universities during demobilization.

The serious situation affecting the Canadian packing plant as a result of the cessation of British orders for bacon is set forth in a strongly worded cable to the British authorities.

THE OUTLOOK GOOD

For Red Shield Drive of Salvation Army.

The district manager, John M. Linden, Chicago, whose field is the sixteen counties in Ontario (Eastern) and the province of Quebec, with the exception of Montreal and Quebec cities, is very enthusiastic over his line-up of committees which have charge of the Red Shield Drive of the Salvation Army in this territory.

Already splendid grants have been made by the following: Perth, in Lanark county, \$3,000; Prescott, in Grenville county, \$1,500; Dundas, Stormont and Glengarry counties, \$12,500; Renfrew town, in Renfrew county, \$2,000; Northumberland and Durham counties, \$5,000; Prince Edward county, \$5,000 and in many other places when the councils meet at the end of January there is great hope that they will make grants, especially in Carleton, Peterboro, Frontenac, Lennox, Prescott and Russell, these grants coming from the county councils.
