POULTRY SHOW DRAWS WELL

THERE WERE OVER A THOUSAND PRESENT ON WEDNESDAY

The Management Well Pleased—Eastern Ontario Poultry Association to Hold an Organization Meeting at Belleville.

The armouries was thronged on Wednesday evening, by people interested in poultry. There were 750 adult tickets taken at the door and about 300 children were admitted, which establishes the victory poultry show as a great attraction. The management are greatly pleased over the second day's results, so is Master William Patterson, of 161 Queen street, as he won the pen of Barred Rocks.

During the evening there was a meeting of delegates from twelve poultry associations of Eastern Ontario, which includes all places west of Port Hope, Ottawa, Carleton Place, Smith's Falls, Napanee, Belleville were represented. Letters of regret were received from Picton, Peterboro and Lindsay. The object of the meeting was to form a union of all the associations, and a committee composed of Dr. Barnes, of Ottawa, and W. A. Paterson, Kingston, was appointed to arrange for an organization meeting at Belleville on Feb. 4th, when a report will be presented, and plans for next year will be drawn up and sent to the confederation meeting to be held on Feb. 5th. The federation will standardize classifications of poultry and arrange show dates, forming a circuit of the local associations so that Government lecturers and demonstrators can be present and address the members on poultry breeding and egg production.

W. A. Brown, chief of the poultry division, Eye stock branch Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, was present and gave a most instructive and inspiring address. He has just returned from Charlottetown, P.E.I., where he found the people most enthusiastic poultry breeders. He stated that pure-bred poultry was the basis of progress, and he showed how the farmers failed to appreciate this great fact, and dressed their best cockerels for the market, leaving the stunted ones with the flock. He also told of the culling demonstrations carried on by his branch. The demonstrations in culling were given whenever an application was made by six persons, or a poultry association.

The demonstrators showed how any poultry keeper could detect the non-laying hens and pullets. This resulted in a great saving of feed, and perpetuated the laying strain. He described the points that indicate the good laying hens. While it was all very well to admire plumage and fancy breeds, the laying

hen is what is wanted in Canada. "Production" was the watchword. Much had been done by the breeding clubs to awaken interest, but the local associations could do a great deal in educating the people. He said the industry needs more organization and the development of plans for making the associations of more value to farmers and the country at large. A market intelligence system must be perfected to begot confidence in the market; despatch in marketing so that eggs may be promptly transported from the poultry keeper to the point of consumption or storage; and the last great essential was stock improvement. Upon these things rests the whole success of the poultry industry. The live stock breeders had by organization placed their industry on a solid foundation, but the poultry industry was far behind. The Government was anxious to render every possible assistance to the poultry men.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Brown and Charles Anglin, who acted as chairman, expressed how heartily his address was appreciated.

R. J. Bushell informed the visitors at the show that on Thursday the I.O.D.E. would furnish refreshments at the armouries during the afternoon and evening.

The last pen, consisting of beautiful White Wyandottes, will be given away at 9 o'clock on Thursday evening. The judging of the birds will be finished at noon.

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH IS FREE OF DEBT

And Has a Balance on Hand of \$1,260—Minister's Salary Increased.

The annual congregational meeting of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church was held on Wednesday evening, Rev. J. W. Stephen presiding. The reports of the various organizations were read and were very satisfactory. The financial statement showed the church to be in a strong financial position. Receipts for the year were \$12,779, and disbursements \$11,519, which included a payment of \$1,500 on the mortgage, which was entirely paid off early in the year. The balance on hand amounts to \$1,260. A considerable amount of repair work, especially to the church tower, was done during the year.

T. D. Robinson, D. Allen Black, J. A. Minnes and Lt.-Col. W. H. Craig were elected to the board of managers for the ensuing three years. The pastor, Rev. J. W. Stephen, was granted an increase of salary. The meeting closed with votes of thanks to the various leaders of organizations and to the choir.
