IMPROVEMENTS TO HARBOR A SOLDIERS CLUB ROOM

WERE UNDER CONSIDERATION
EIGHT YEARS AGO.

Then Estimated That It Would Cost
About \$600,000 to Make It Na-
tional in Character.

In connection with the movement
on foot now to have the improve-
ments made to the local harbor, so as
to put it into shape for the receiving
of the big boats, after the work on
the Welland canal has been finished,
and thus make this port a terminal,
it is of interest to note the action
which was taken in September, 1911,
The Whig of Sept. 13th, 1911, has
the following:

"That the Dominion Government
has recognized the necessity and de-
sirability of making the harbor of
Kingston a great national port is a
matter of congratulation, as \$50,000
has been voted and placed in the es-
timate as a first instalment of an
appropriation that will mean hun-
dreds of thousands of dollars before
the work is completed.

"Early this year strong representa-
tions were made by the Dominion
Marine Association, the Kingston
City Council, and the Board of Trade,
to the Dominion Government, urging
it to improve the harbor so as to ac-
commodate the on-sweep of commerce
that must come here as a result of
the enlargement of the Welland ca-
nal. The Government was so im-
pressed that the matter was carefully
gone into, and the report of the dis-
trict engineer, S. J. Chapleau, sets
forth that to make the harbor na-
tional in character would require an
expenditure in the neighborhood of
\$600,000. The harbor would have
to be dredged to a depth sufficient to
accommodate the deep draft vessels
of the upper lakes, and this would
require a depth of twenty-two feet
throughout the harbor. The Gov-
ernment realized the great impor-
tance of Kingston as a great trans-
shipping point."

Since that time the causeway has
been built. Now, dredging must be
undertaken.

WITH THE VETERANS.

Provost Marshal Wants the Return-
ed Men to Salute.

The committee in charge of the
G.W.V.A. year book, under the
chairmanship of C. W. Topping, has
almost completed arrangements for
the publication of this book. It will
be a handsome volume, and one of
general interest to all soldiers. It
is being printed by the British Whig
Publishing Company.

The provost marshal of the Do-
minion of Canada has addressed a
letter to the veterans' associations
asking that they co-operate in the
observing of regulations by men
awaiting discharge, especially in re-
gard to saluting and dress. As a
result, Major Black, the A.P.M. in
Kingston, will address the G. W. V.
A. meeting on Monday next.

There is a strong inclination in
the ranks of the G.W.V.A. to begin
the operation of a People's Forum
in their association, and from small
beginnings to work up to large
things. The Government Speakers'
Bureau have promised their co-
operation.

The repatriation employment of-
fice in the Kingston district will
probably open about the first of
February. It will be superintended
by a returned man, and the male
staff will all be composed of dis-
charged soldiers. The office, it is
expected, will be located in the old
Liberal club rooms.

TO BE OPENED BY THE KNIGHTS
OF COLUMBUS

Who Will Use Some of Their Army
Hat Fund in the Comfort of Re-
turned Soldiers—The Plan Under
Way.

Those in charge of the Knights of
Columbus Catholic Army Hats Fund
are going to spend a certain amount
of the money collected in Canada in-
stead of overseas on account of de-
mobilization coming so soon. Their
plans include the opening of club
houses in each of the twenty-two dis-
persal stations from Halifax to Vic-
toria. In Ontario six of these will
be opened, at London, Port Arthur,
Ottawa, Kingston, Hamilton and To-
ronto. These clubs will be free to
all soldiers, irrespective of creed,
color and nationality. The work in
Ontario is in charge of F. J. Schenk,
of Hamilton, who is at present in
Kingston looking over the prospects
for the work in Kingston, and mak-
ing arrangements for the local club
houses.

A local organization, under the
presidency of ex-Ald. N. E. O'Connor
has been formed, and had a meeting
for organization purposes in the
early part of this week. In King-
ston it is proposed to open club rooms
at the Soldiers' Club. Various
sites for club rooms are under con-
sideration, but so far nothing definite
has been done.

The man in charge of the Knights
of Columbus work in Canada is
Lieut.-Col. Clarence F. Smith, com-
ptroller of the fund, who is also chair-
man of the Patriotic Fund in Mont-
real. His offices are in the Drum-
mond building in that city. Lieut.-
Col. Sylvester, of the Canadian Chap-
lain Force, is on the board of the
fund. He was in Kingston on Wed-
nesday and Thursday looking over
the ground in this district.
