DEMAND CHANGES IN THE TARIFF

And Acceptance of Reciprocity With the United States. Regina, Sask., Jan. 24.—Demands for immediate substantial reduction in preferential and customs tariffs, including acceptance of the reciprocity pact with the United States, will be made on the Federal Government by the unanimous vote of the Saskatchewan Assembly, the Conservatives of the province for the first time on record having thrown in its lot with the Government on the tariff issue.
