Military Matters

Pte. C. J. Fitzgerald, No. 3 C.A.S.C. Service Company, has been transferred to the Clearing Services Command, Quebec.

Pte. J. D. Phean, No. 3 C.A.S.C. Service Company, has returned from duty with the supply depot, Cobourg, and has been posted to the horse transport section, Kingston.

Twenty-three men were discharged from No. 3 Casualty Company at Barrieffield to civil life on Thursday, and sixty-two were discharged on Friday.

A platform has been erected in the recreation room at the Barrieffield Barracks. This will add greatly to the enjoyment of concerts and other entertainments.

The post office at the Barrieffield huts is located in the recreation room, and is under the charge of the Y.M.C.A. secretary.

It has been published in orders that in receiving further application for war service badges, classes "B" and "C" badges are not to be filled where the reason for discharge is given as "On Demobilization." Applications for these badges will only be granted when the applicant has been discharged as medically unfit.

Any men returning from overseas who do not wish to be discharged at the present time may, at their own request, be transferred to the 3rd Battalion, Canadian Garrison Regiment, or if qualified to the clerical staff of No. 3 military district.

Lieut.-Col. Henry Harrison arrived at Barrieffield to-day with his establishment, which will be demobilized forthwith.
