ADDRESSED THE G.W.V.A. INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

ON RE-ESTABLISHMENT AND ON DISCIPLINE.

Lieut.-Col. Crocker, President, and Capt. Black, A.P.M., Give the Veterans Timely Talks.

The meeting of the G.W.V.A. on Monday evening was addressed by the president, Lieut.-Col. R. Crocker, R.F.A. also stated that he had just returned from Ottawa and explained what was being done by this Association in regard to the work of re-establishment of the returned man. He said that he was glad to be able to state emphatically that the G.W.V.A. was recognized by the Government, and that its representative committee in Ottawa always received a favourable hearing on any question which it discussed with the Government. He emphasized the need of unity between members of local branches, without which unity of the whole Association would be impossible. He pointed out the necessity of always being able to back up any statement made by this or any branch with hard and fast facts before making any sweeping indictment which on investigation could not be substantiated.

The A.P.M., Capt. Black also addressed the meeting. He stated that his topic was on the subject of discipline. The provost marshal of Canada had advised that it was thought advisable to gain the co-operation of the G.W.V.A. in connection with the department of the returned man. He asked the co-operation of the members and said that it was in some cases most deplorable to see a member of a famous Canadian regiment, whose unit had probably a record which would compare favourably with any regiment of the war, appearing un-dressed on the streets, or unshaved. He well understood that after the return of the man from over-seas the feeling was that they were "through" with the army, but in spite of that he hoped that returned men would see, with him, that to appear slovenly dressed, bright-dishy on the regiment, whose badge they were proud to wear. Capt. Black's address was well received, and a vote of thanks extended to him for his courtesy in taking such action.

It was resolved that the following matters be taken up with the authorities:

That the clothing allowance as at present authorized to be more retroactive to the commencement of the war; that the post discharge pay issued to men with service over-seas prior to Nov. 11th, 1918, be increased to the rate authorized on the order-in-council regarding war service gratuity; that the order-in-council governing the free transportation of soldiers' dependents from England be made retroactive, and that monies so expended be refunded to soldiers.

Lyman E. Johnson Must Face a Charge of Horse Stealing in West.

Acting for the police at Regina, Sask., Sergt. James Bateson and Constable John Naylor, on Monday night, placed under arrest Lyman Edward Johnson, aged seventeen years, on a charge of horse stealing. The youth is being held at the police station, awaiting an officer from the west.

Johnson was placed under arrest, following the receipt of a photograph and a description of the person wanted, by Chief of Police Robert Nesbitt, from Regina.
